**Washington Letter.**  
 (From our Regular Correspondent.)  
 The Speaker and the democratic  
 leader of the House were prostrated  
 by sudden illness the past week,  
 and in consequence, little of impor-  
 tance was done in that body.  
 Among the bills passed by congress  
 in that time, I will name the act in  
 regard to permissible writing and  
 printing on third and fourth class  
 matter, which has just become a  
 law, and the bill appropriating  
 \$585,000 for agricultural experiment  
 stations in connection with the var-  
 ious agricultural colleges through-  
 out the country.

The House spent a good portion  
 of one day in filibustering to pre-  
 vent consideration of the bill pre-  
 sented by Mr. Wilkins, of Ohio, to  
 increase the national bank circula-  
 tion, which effort was successful,  
 under the leadership of Messrs  
 Weaver, of Iowa and Anderson of  
 Kansas. The remainder of the  
 same day was devoted by the House  
 to the reception of the pictures of  
 the three Massachusetts speakers,  
 presented by the Old Bay State,  
 and added to the portrait gallery.  
 There were a number of excellent  
 speeches, and the occasion was of  
 such general interest that for first  
 time during the session, there was  
 not a vacant seat on the floor or in  
 the galleries. Among the orators  
 who attracted most attention were  
 Messrs Long and Lodge, of Mas-  
 sachusetts, and Mr. Breckenridge,  
 of Kentucky.

The first regular appropriation  
 bill reported is the pension bill,  
 the amount proposed being a little  
 over eighty and a quarter million  
 dollars, which is four millions  
 above the estimate.

In response to petitions from all  
 parts of the Union, Mr. Taulbee,  
 of Kentucky, has introduced an  
 iron clad prohibition bill for the  
 District of Columbia, but, with re-  
 freshing frankness, that gentle-  
 man, who prides himself on being  
 the only democratic prohibition-  
 ists in congress from his state, ad-  
 mits that there is no possibility of  
 its passage.

The most important legislation  
 in the Senate was the passage of  
 the act to refund the direct tax of  
 1861, all such claims to be filed  
 within six years. An ineffectual  
 attempt was made by the Southern  
 senators to include the tax on cot-  
 ton.

As to the Blair educational bill, I  
 will mention that Ex-Judge Wm.  
 Strong, of the United States Su-  
 preme Court, retired, is delivering  
 a regular course of lectures on the  
 constitution of the United States  
 before the students of Columbia  
 Law school of this city. His last  
 lecture was on the first clause of  
 the eighth section, Article I. The  
 congress shall have power to lay  
 and collect taxes, duties, imports  
 and exercise, to pay the debts and  
 provide for the common defense  
 and general welfare of the United  
 States.

In the course of the remarks of  
 the judge, he was asked by a stu-  
 dent if, in his opinion, the Blair  
 educational bill was constitutional?  
 The judge promptly replied, "It is  
 my opinion that it is unconstitutional,  
 and this I believe to be the  
 opinion of the present bench.

The above is obtained from a  
 student of the law school; not  
 wishing to make any mistake in the  
 matter, your correspondent pro-  
 ceeded to the residence of Ex-Jus-  
 tice Strong, finding him at home.  
 He was asked "Is it true that you  
 gave an opinion before the Colum-  
 bia Law School against the consti-  
 tutionality of the Blair bill?"  
 His answer was, "I did say that it  
 was my opinion that the measure  
 was unconstitutional, but it was in  
 reply to a question and not as part  
 of my lecture. I had no intention  
 or thought that my remarks would  
 become public property, or I would  
 not have given an opinion. Ever

since I retired from the bench, it  
 has been my fixed principle never  
 to give publicity to an opinion on  
 any matter before the Supreme  
 Court, and I shall not depart from  
 it. I am constantly in consultation  
 and intercourse with members of  
 the bench, and my opinion on  
 questions before the court is fre-  
 quently asked by the judges, but I  
 never vary from the determination  
 taken when I left the bench. If I  
 were a congressman, I might feel  
 more at liberty to discuss the Blair  
 bill and kindred measures, but I  
 am not. I believe in a strict con-  
 striction of the constitution.

The above opinion from Judge  
 Strong is undoubtedly a heavy  
 handicap for the Blair bill to  
 carry, for in all probability the  
 judge but voiced the opinion of a  
 majority of the Supreme Court.  
 What effect it will have on the  
 status of the Blair bill in congress,  
 it is impossible to say at this time;  
 but it can scarcely be favorable to  
 that measure.
