Stone, of Kentucky, has introduced a bill in congress to do away with the electoral college that the voice of the people may be had direct in the selection of president. It will win in the long run, if not now. United States senators should also be elected by a direct vote of the people.

With whatever else Cleveland may be chargeable, a want of boldness is not found. Every paper emanating from his hand, is characterized by a fearlessness that would be admirable in any one. His greatest enemies give him credit for the courage of his convictions, and an honesty of purpose that neither knuckles to friends nor quails before foes.

Our congressman has introduced in congress a bill appropriating \$18,000 for the construction of a life-saving station and lighthouse at the mouth of the Coquille river, in Oregon. We need a light house now and with increased shipping in the near future it will be indispensable. It would not only be of benefit to local, but outside shipping as well.

The organization of a teachers' association in this county is a step in the right direction. Every possible encouragement should be given it. Its next meeting will be in Coquille City on Feb. 23, and we trust our transportation lines, hotels and the people generally will see that the treatment of those who are public spirited enough to devote their time and energies to this needed work, is becoming a generous and appreciative people.

Oates, of Alabama, introduced a bill in congress regulating immigration and providing that no alien shall be admitted to America who is an idiot, insane or a pauper, or who has been legally convicted of felony, or is an anarchist, polygamist or socialist; or afflicted with any contagious disease, or is under contract to labor for any person or firm. The bill will meet the hearty approval of most people every where. It should have every vote in congress.

It is to be hoped that congress will at once admit the territories to statehood if it will obviate the necessity of an extra session of congress, and it is said that is inevitable in the spring, and for the purpose named, wholly. Our national congress is an expensive concern any way, and to make it more so unnecessarily, is an insult to the American people. Months were spent last season in the discussion of a single question from partisan points of view, and with no aim or desire for an agreement simply to manufacture campaign thunder while on the bounty of the people, instead of settling affairs de nationale.

The amounts as estimated by the Secretary of the Treasury for this part of Oregon in the next annual appropriation for improvements of rivers and harbors are, \$200,000 for Coos bay and \$50,000 for Coquille river. These amounts would do some good, and not become exhausted by the time repairs were made to cover the ravages of the surf to temporary works. Congress in making appropriations should have this forcibly impressed on their minds. It must be apparent, when average congressmen think of it, that there must be a big waste dilly dallying with small sums on works that must eventually cost hundreds of thousands. It would be considered very poor management on the part of an individual to do a little to which amounted to everything to him and was half undone between times. It would be more business-like to defer operations until he was ready, and then go to work with a will and finish the job. There may be works where the labor would be so extensive that but a limited number of employees could be profitably engaged, but it is not so here. Former appropriations have been so small that work could only be carried on a few months each year; the balance of the time was given over to the ravages of the storms and battling surf. The short-sighted policy is further seen when appropriations were refused because there was an unexpended one already. It were far better to let half a dozen such as we have had in the past accumulate.
