LAUNCH OF THE "LIBERTY."

The New Tug Successfully Baptized—A Beautiful Craft.

The launch of the tug which has been on the stocks for some time, was accomplished late Thursday evening without mishap of any sort. The tide served at 8:30, by which time the street and yard were crowded with people who had gathered from all quarters to witness the baptism.

At about 8 o'clock Hon. Binger Hermann and party were invited on board, when from the bow of the craft, Oregon's congressman addressed the assembly below in encouraging terms, assuring the continuance of government work already commenced and expressing the hope and belief that its effect on the river will be to secure and maintain for us a greatly increased depth of water on the bar.

A few minutes after the conclusion of the speech, ominous sledge hammer blows stirred the crowd to a high pitch of expectancy, to find relief a moment later, in the spectacle of the beautiful craft gliding smoothly into the stream and gracefully rounding to at the snubbing line pulled taut. As the tug moved down the ways she was christened the "Liberty," by Rena Averill, the little daughter of W. H. Averill, one of the owners.
