Dempsy Knocked Out. San Francisco, Aug. 28.—The fight between Jack Dempsy and George La Blanche for a purse of \$5,500, 500 to go to the loser, which occurred under the auspices of the California athletic club last night, eclipsed all similar contests ever held in this city.

The thirty-first round was exceedingly tame, but when the men came up for the thirty-second round Dempsy attempted to force matters. He was far the fresher man, and with but few exceptions had the fight all his own way up to the present time. He forced La Blanche into a corner and pounded him unmercifully. The latter received staggering blows on the head and neck, but stood up under them, and the men gradually worked to the center of the ring and while Dempsy still continued to find the Mariner's neck, the latter whirled around suddenly and caught Dempsy a terrific blow on the jaw. The Nonpariel went down like a shot. He fell heavily upon his face, and blood spouted out upon the floor. Ten seconds went by amid intense excitement. Dempsy struggled bravely to arise, but before he had reached his feet, weak and staggering, time had expired, and the referee awarded the fight to La Blanche.

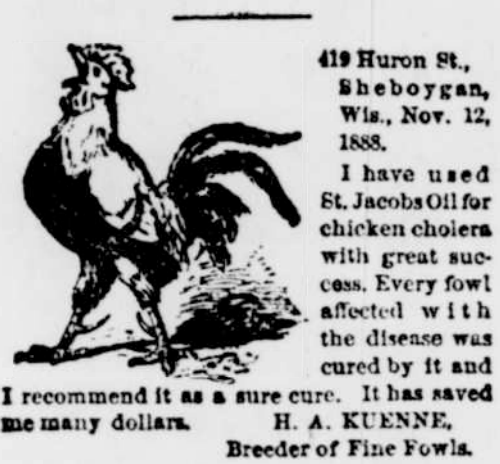

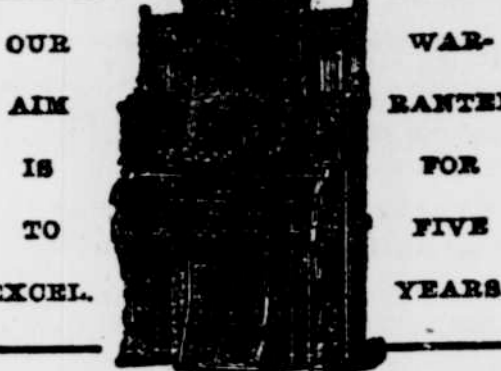
