One of the most important of all public improvements made in Douglas county for many years is the new road which is now being made from Camas valley to Myrtle Point, Coos county. The work of construction has been in progress for some time and is being vigorously pushed by the contractors of the different sections. Messrs. James Byron, Wm. Wells and K. B. Ireland have the contract for making the Douglas county end, and now have a force of forty men employed and could give work to more. From those who have examined the work already completed by them, we learn that they are making a splendid road, fully up to the terms of their contract, if not better. Mr. Byron, who was in Roseburg Tuesday, told a Review reporter that they had already three miles of road constructed, with the exception of the two bridges which were framed and ready to put up and cover as soon as the lumber could be sawed at Ferguson's new steam saw mill in Camas valley which begins running to-morrow, Friday.

Mr. Fox, contractor of the Coos county part of the road has forty-five men employed, and is making good progress toward reaching the Douglas county line. He is said to be making a good road also. Mr. Todd, a sub-contractor under Fox, has the middle section of the road and keeps a force of thirty men busy. He has only one mile more to build. On the whole the work seems to be progressing rapidly and satisfactorily, and by the 1st of December a splendid wagon road will connect Douglas and Coos counties. This was a great public necessity and will be of benefit to the people of both counties. Much trade that heretofore gone to California will be turned in this direction and the two counties will be brought into closer relationship. A large area of agricultural

being located every day, and large numbers of strangers are constantly going into that section. The last legislature have the thanks of the citizens of both counties for the \$15,000 appropriation which insures the building of the new road.—Roseburg Review.

A Substitute for Glass.
We read in our English exchanges that a new translucent substance intended as a substitute for glass has been satisfactorily adopted in some of the public buildings of London. It possesses such a degree of pliancy that it may be bent backward and forward like leather and be subjected to very considerable tensile strain without injury; it is also almost as transparent as glass and of a pleasing amber color, varying in shade from a very light golden to a pale brown. The basis of the material is a web of fine iron wire with warp and weft threads about one-twelfth inch apart, this being enclosed like a fly in amber in a sheet of translucent varnish of which the base is linseed oil. There is no resin or gum in the varnish, and once having become dry it is capable of standing heat and damp without undergoing any change, neither hardening nor becoming sticky. Briefly, the manufacture is accomplished by dipping the sheets edge-wise into deep tanks of varnish and then allowing the coating which they thus receive to dry in a warm atmosphere. It requires somewhat more than a dozen of these dips to bring the sheets to the required degree of thickness, and when this has been accomplished the material is stored for several weeks to thoroughly season.—Science.

A New Steamer for this Coast.
Poughkeepsie, Sept. 29.—The steamer City of Kingston has been sold for \$135,000, to the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company, and will be taken to Portland. The steamer, which is one of the hand-somest on the river, will be taken by way of the Straits of Magellan. The same company is looking after other boats on the Hudson. The Kingston will make her last trip to-morrow.

American Pluck.
When the history of the latter half of this country is fully written up, one of the most interesting chapters will deal with the remarkable recuperative power evinced by our people under the weight of crushing disaster. Chicago rose from her ruins more beautiful and majestic than before, and what in some portions of the world would have entirely blotted her out of existence, is now acknowledged to have been a blessing in disguise, and to have made her a finer and more prosperous city than she would ever have otherwise been. Boston, Charleston and other cities since then have, to a greater or less degree, followed her example, and we have no doubt but Johnston and Seattle will ere long be added to the list of those who have snatched victory from defeat. Already the hum of business is in the air at Seattle, and a year hence that city will be far advanced on the way to more solidity and city like aspect than she would have reached in many a year to come had this calamity not overtaken her.

High Culture and Penning.
The late E. P. Roe used to say that the secret of success in small fruit culture might be found in two words, stimulation and restriction. By stimulation he meant a thoroughly pulverized and enriched soil. This is especially necessary to the strawberry, the foreign raspberry and all the currants. A rampant growing raspberry, like Cuthbert or Turner, and our vigorous blackberries, do not require stimulation, but they do require restriction. By restriction he meant the development of fruit, rather than wood of vines. Set out a strawberry plant in very deep, rich moist soil, and its tendency is to follow the great law of nature and procreate itself; but to the degree that it makes plants it cannot make fruit. Cut off every runner and enormous fruit

quantity. This is equally true of raspberries. Current bushes crowded with wood bear little fruit.—Ex.

The New Navy Yard.
Washington, Sept. 27.—The Naval Commissioners appointed to select a site for a navy yard on the Pacific coast, north of forty-second parallel, to-day formally report to the Secretary of the navy that, in its judgment, Puget sound was the best locality in the entire region. Port Orchard possesses many advantages over all the other divisions and the particular site should be sought for behind Bainbridge island. The appraised estimate for the entire site recommended, comprising 1810 acres, \$33,129. The owners, valuation for the same aggregates \$37,964. One lot of 5975 acres included in the above is situated on Lake Kitsap, in order facilitate to the use of the waters of the lake by the government if desired.

Diversified Farming.
The one crop system followed up, will breed disease, on matter what the crops will, in a measure, if not wholly, prevent its development. Diverse crops on the same soil is measureably a preventive and as well a rejuvenator of the soil. Corn following corn, or wheat following wheat for a series of years is the prime cause of insect pests. Whereas an absolute change, not only of crop, but of variety of crop so as to induce a change in the method of cultivation, in the habits of plant growth and the demands on the soil will be very apt to prevent the development of insect pests.

HOW TO OBTAIN LAND.—Any person entitled to pre-empt and homestead a quarter section of land may exercise both privileges by taking the pre-emption first. The government laws prohibit anyone from leaving any land of his own to pre-empt, and if a homestead or timber claim is desired, it can be taken after the pre-emption has been secured. By taking this course, a man can secure 480 acres of land. A pre-emption is obtained by six months residence and the payment of \$1.25 per acre within thirty-three months of settlement. A residence of five years and the payment of \$22 and other small fees at the land office, is necessary to secure a homestead or it may be computed on the terms of a pre-emption. Lands, valuable chiefly for timber or stone, may be purchased direct from the government at \$2.50 per acre, on easy terms, and the amount sold to one person is limited to 320 acres. Tide lands are sold by the state on similar terms to the school lands. There is also a special provision for selling mineral and coal lands direct from the government.—Ex.
