Many strangers in town Thursday.  
Rev. Adams preached several evenings last week.

A new roof has been placed upon the Lehnherr hotel.

Edwards & Dalmas' chop mill has been running at night.

Uncle John Barklow completed threshing his grain Wednesday.

Baked salmon was a fine treat at Mrs. Majory's hotel a few days since.

Capt. W. E. Rackliff has the foundation laid for a barn on his town property.

Fires in the mountains and foothills have been extinguished by the late rains.

Wise & Bender have a large stock of paints, oils, varnishes, and staining material and brushes in abundance.

G. W. Majory moved his stock of liquors to Coquille City last week; so this place has but one saloon at present.

Wm. Volkmar is kept very busy making valleys for the many roofs being put upon buildings. He is a good workman.

Teams begin to come up from Bandon after winter supplies of fruits. Levi Gant and Joseph Ferry will load a good many wagons.

Shingles are in demand at Myrtle Point. J. C. Brown purchased seventeen thousand at the shingle mill at Coquille City. They are well made.

W. H. and Charles Bunch will soon have a shingle mill in operation near Alex. H. Snyder's place. They are looking for their machinery daily.

The meat market of Miller & Smith has gained much popularity in this city from the fact that they keep the best of meats. Their steak is superb.

The farmers on the up-river are beginning to haul in the logs for needed lumber. We saw Earnest Hermann unloading a fine cedar log last week.

Rev. Pullen will soon open a singing school. He is a good teacher. He has a strong voice which is necessary in order to be a successful teacher.

The Lehnherr house has been crowded to its fullest capacity since Mrs. Majory took charge. She will keep up the popularity of this excellent house.

W. P. Hermann was in town Wednesday. He reports that his crops were very short this year, however, he will make several thousand pounds of his excellent bacon this season.

W. A. Border has the painters, Rufus Horton and Allen Dodge, painting the inside of the Myrtle Point hotel. This house is closed for a few weeks and is being generally renovated.

A literary society will soon be organized in this place. It is intended that it shall be made very interesting. It is hoped that the young people of this town will take an interest in the exercises.

Dr. Gussenhoven performed a delicate surgical operation a few days since by removing a piece of steel from under the arm of Mr. E. Williams. It was a portion of an ax that broke off and embedded itself under the arm while Mr. W. was chopping.

George Fredinburg and brother are making an effort to establish a tannery on the Middle fork, and have the lumber on the ground for that purpose and every one should encourage this enterprise as much as possible, as it will, if successful, retain a great many dollars in the country that is sent out every year for supplies for the shoemakers and saddlers.

Wise & Bender are fitting up their warehouse near the steamer landing for the purpose of receiving a very large and varied stock of paints, oils and varnishes which will arrive during this week.

Pipes were laid last week leading from Edwards & Dalmas water tank to the Lehnherr hotel. The water is pumped by machinery from the river to the reservoir which stands on a high bank and it can be led to nearly every door in town. This will furnish pure and wholesome water to the town in the near future, thus adding another benefit from the saw mill.

Rev. Mr. Craig of the M. E. church (South) preached a very eloquent and interesting sermon to a fair house in this place Friday evening. Such able expounders of the doctrines and principles of Christianity gives tone and dignity to the exalted position that every teacher of morality and truth should occupy. It was unanimously regretted that this able pulpit-ator could not remain longer.

One of our citizens who is building a nice residence wished to have some bay windows placed in the front of his house, but could not find the proper sash in the many stores on the river, and as it was to late in the season to send to San Francisco for them he was obliged to forego this elegant and useful convenience. Thus we see that a manufacturing establishment for sash and doors is needed some where on the Coquille. This industry alone would make much difference in the cash account of the citizens of the valley. It would be difficult to estimate the amount of money sent from this section yearly for these necessary articles. Now is the time for these industries to be started and many more that we might mention, and as above stated the gold and silver that pass out of the country would be retained here and there would be but little cause for complaint of hard times. Who will take the lead in these matters?

It is strange that the grand opportunity to establish a creamery at Myrtle Point does not attract the attention of some one versed in that business. Again it appears to us that the farmers in this vicinity are able, if they would organize to enter into this lucrative undertaking themselves. They could employ parties to superintend the manufacturing process and attend to the other work themselves, and thus inaugurate an industry that would bring cash into the country, which would make a great difference in their balancing up the income of the year. The farms in this valley do not produce that which brings money sufficiently to meet the grocery bills and other articles such as clothing and farm implements, and the result will be the same here as it has been in some of our sister counties in the interior, viz: The farms will be under mortgage shortly and hard times will close in to the ruin of many a hopeful granger, hence the people should look around for some industry that brings coin in, in the place of it going out at all times.
