The freight bill for the Salem woolen-mill on machinery sent from the East was \$5000.

The Grand Lodge of A. F. and A. M. of California re-elected M. M. Estee grand master.

Mr. Gladder of Healdsburg Cal., realized \$1340 from three and three-fourths acres of prunes.

B. F. Tupper, of the Bandon Recorder, was in town Friday.

The Spokane Globe, which was burned out in the great fire, has again made its appearance.

A little girl seven years old, living nine miles southeast of Smith Centre, Kan., has plowed twelve acres of ground for fall wheat with a three horse riding plow.—Ex.

The steamer Wisconsin landed one hundred and thirty-five Mormons in New York on the 18th. They came from Europe and will be taken to Salt Lake in a few days.

A young lady of Columbus, Georgia, has made a crazy quilt out of lottery tickets that failed to connect with the prize wheel. The numbers are worked in silk of beautiful colors.

A Jacksonville lady recently sent a green stone found on the beach near Crescent City by her daughter to be polished by a San Francisco lapidary, and last week learned that it was a fine emerald worth \$2,500.—Ex.

A fireman on the New York electric wire system was burned to death in sight of hundreds of pedestrians last week. Firemen came to his assistance but the vital spark had fled before the wires could be cut.

East Portland has passed an ordinance forbidding the Salvation Army people from holding services in the streets. As far as we can learn Boston and East Portland are the only two cities that passed ordinances to that effect.

Two priests at Fort Worth, Tex., have been arraigned for murdering a boy last August in the convent over which they had control. A young lad escaped from the convent and told the story and another priest implicated in the affair has skipped.

George Fish Russell and Gertrude Elizabeth Penney, only daughter of Gov. Penney, were married at Portland last week.

While playing baseball at Heppner, Or., Clarence E. Pullen, aged 21 years; dropped dead. The deceased had just made a home run.

Judge Matthew P. Deady, United States district judge for the district of Oregon, is at Womley's hotel, Washington, D. C., very ill. He went east to consult Justice Field's physician.

The Labrador fishermen are in distress and are slowly starving to death. Report says that one family lived on the carcasses of a dog for three days and when that was gone all the family except the father and son died. Another place a father and mother subsisted on the body of their infant for days and finally starved.

The largest gun in existence, and the heaviest ever made by the Krupp works, has recently been completed and sent to Cronstadt, where it will be mounted. It is of cast steel and weighs 235 tons. The caliber is 13 inches, the barrel is 40 feet in length and it has a maximum diameter of 6 3/4 feet. The weapon has a range of eleven miles and the mechanism is so perfect that two shots a minute can be fired, each shot, however, costing from \$1250 to \$1500.

The allowing of the landing of Chinese in this country is bringing down an avalanche of abuse from the present administration from the Pacific coast press. The S. F. Call, though a leading administration organ, is bitter, and remains President Harrison of the promises he made of enforcing the exclusion act. The president will stand a poor show of succeeding himself if he does not improve the record he made in congress on this question, and so far he has not.

What may be called the Sunday movement seems to be spreading in Europe. The fact has already been mentioned in these columns that an effort was being made in France to secure one day out of seven as a general holiday for workmen of all classes. News now comes from Russia that a movement is on foot there for the observance of the Sabbath in a similar manner to the practice of Great Britain and America. Already over twelve hundred of the leading merchants and manufacturers of St Petersburg have signified their willingness to keep their establishments closed on Sunday, and the movement is received with great favor.

What is Fog?

Although the people in this coast country have had considerable experience with the above named article they have not taken the responsibility on themselves to decipher the properties it is composed of. The following is the nearest solution we have seen: "Fog is simply a cloud composed of water dust, or solid minute spheres of water from 1-7000 to 1-1000 of an inch in diameter. Many have supposed that a dust particle must be the nucleus of each sphere, but an examination under the microscope of evaporated fog has proved that such is not the case. Briefly stated, the cause of fog is as follows; it is essential that there be no wind. The sky must be clear. The air must be saturated or nearly so. The formation of fog is purely a mechanical process, unaccompanied by heat."

Fire at Grant's Pass.

Grant's Pass, Or., Oct. 17.—Fire totally destroyed the saw and floor factory of the Sugar Pine Door and Lumbering company, of this place last night, also 200,000 feet of lumber. The loss is estimated at \$50,000. There was no insurance. Ten thousand dollars have already been subscribed by the citizens to rebuild.

A New Jersey mosquito flew over the line into Haverstraw, New York. It broke a window and flew into Mayor Milburn's office. Thomas Shankey drew a revolver and fired two bullets at the predatory bird, which escaped. The mayor and Shankey escaped all injury.
