Another Blanket.

Boston, Oct. 24.—The management of the Oregon Improvement Company is about to propose a blanket mortgage for \$15,000,000 to run fifty years at 5 per cent. without a sinking fund. It is reported that the mortgage is being prepared. A part of the scheme is to retire unsecured first mortgage sixes and preferred stock, to pay the pressing floating debt, amounting to \$600,000, and build two new steamers. The management has already purchased the Atchison's coast steamer City of Topeka for \$66,000. It is thought that \$1,500,000 will provide for the construction of the next two years. The mortgage scheme, it is expected, will make a reduction from the present charges of 3 to one per cent for common stock. But the object of retiring the sixes is rather to give a first mortgage lien to the new bonds than to reduce charges.

There are trusts in money also, for does not Uncle Sam put on the silver dollar, "In God we trust." It would seem, however, that if there was a little more trust of this sort there would be fewer trusts of other kind. But the latest trust is the base ball trust. This caps the climax and is the saddest of all. It is "foul." It is "base." There should be a "short stop" put to it and a "grand stand" ought to be made against it by every lover of this national sport, for there is no "foul" for it among the multitude of other trusts. It certainly should be "struck out" of the list. The man who will kick the base ball trust ought to wear "diamonds," and in public estimation there will be no "flies" on him.

The Mail gives an account of the suffering and final rescue of Charles Albert another of the crew of the steamer Alaskan which fouled off Cape Blanco. He remained on board until the boat went down and then was cast into the sea with the wreckage. He floated on a piece of the wreck for seven days subsisting on a can of peaches and was picked up by the bark Kittie lumber laden from Portland to Hong Kong where they arrived the last of August. He wrote to his mother from that place and says he will return on the Kittie. The mother who had mourned him as dead will impatiently await his arrival.
