A Home for Pauper Children.

Washington, Oct. 27.—The report of United States Consul Shearman, at Liverpool, gives a description of the cottage homes recently opened for pauper children, at Fazakerley. These children's cottages are located in West Derby Union, and consist of eighteen cottages, a superintendent's residence, a porter's lodge, a probationary house, infirmary, school house, swimming bath, public hall, store house and a work-for-all. They are handsome and substantial buildings of brick and stone. The cottages are divided into boys' and girls' homes, each one accommodating thirty children. The "girls families" are presided over by "mothers" all widows, who receive an annual salary of \$100 and rations. All work is done by the children and the "mothers." A man and his wife manage each of these cottages, in compliance with the provisions of the act of Congress of June 3, 1878, entitled, "An act for the sale of timber lands in the states of California, Oregon, Nevada and Washington Territory."
