The difference here between the temperature of last month, October, and that of June last was, including decimals, only one degree. Our rainfall however was more than twice the average of the last sixteen years. Our temperature during the cold months is considerably higher than places only a few miles inland. For instance on the fifth of this month, November, we happened to be about eight miles inland from our beach, and in the morning all the place was covered with hoar frost. On the same morning and at the same time the temperature on the beach was 54. This is entirely owing to the Kuro-Siaw or Japan current which comes in with more than usual force and warmth between Cape Arago and Cape Blanco. Both of these capes stretch a long way out into the ocean, and between their huge arms retain the waters so that they are enabled to spread away north or south and the Bandon beach is about the center of this area. Although we are in about the same latitude as New York or 43 north, yet when the New Yorkers are wrapped up in furs, and the whole country buried in snow we Bandonians are walking about in the green fields, and gazing on the great blue ocean sparkling in the golden sunlight, dressed in the very same kind and weight of clothing that we wore on the 4th of July; hence it is that this locality is now beginning to attract a deal of attention, although we are close on a hundred miles distant from the nearest railway.

Daily additions to our population, and new buildings are the order of the day. Mr. Gardiner of Ellensburg is going to erect a new hotel here, the estimated cost of which will be ten thousand dollars. This will be the largest hotel in the county. A new street—Dyer street—had been hardly platted out when building commenced. Mr. Crook is building a nice residence there, and the Rev. Mr. Campbell has another completed and is already residing in it. This street will continue on to Mr. Truman's residence on Bandon beach and from thence on through Bennett street to the beach. Mr. Webster a gentleman from Albany lately bought the Ocean House hotel from a Coos Bay company, and it cost more than half as much as the company paid for it and a hundred acres of building lands in addition not more than three months since.

A large and capacious river steamer is now being built at Bandon, length 100 feet, breadth of beam 19 feet; freight deck 76 feet long by 18 feet wide, and connected with the latter wharf arrangements will be perfected so that any one will be able to drive his wagon and team on board and there they can remain quiet and undisturbed until they arrive at their destination. This will be a great advantage to our summer visitors from Roseburg and elsewhere, as they can drive their wagons on at Myrtle Point laden with their camping outfit, provisions, etc., and have them all delivered safe and sound at the Bandon wharf. The cabin will be 62 feet long by 14 broad and will be furnished in a style to meet the usages and requirements of a civilized community. The engines will be of 250 horse power, and cost \$6743, and are engaged to time 15 miles an hour. She will leave Bandon every morning at 7 1/2 a. m. arrive at Coquille City at 10 a. m. stoppages included. She will leave Myrtle Point at 12.30, call at Coquille City at 2 p. m. thereby giving the visitor at Coquille City four hours to do his business and arrive at Bandon at 4.30 p. m. This will be a great boon to all the people living down the coast as it will give them from 4 to 5 hours to reach home. She will be commanded by Captain Rice an old and experienced steamboat man from the Columbia river.

The new union party promises to figure largely in future Oregon campaigns. It is thought by some that county officers will be elected in some of the interior counties by the new party. The laboring man is seeking a way out of present troubles, and if that discontented element seeks redress for its wrongs (which are far from imaginary) at the ballot box, the old parties will have to look well to their laurels.
