The West Oregon Publishing company will soon issue a republican newspaper at Myrtle Point under the management of Dr. J. J. Gussenhoven. It will advocate the interest of south west Oregon. A new roller press is expected to arrive any day at an outlay of ten or twelve hundred dollars and it is hoped by the publisher that the first number can be issued next week.

Christmas is coming soon, and quite an interest is being felt in regard to the festivities and amusements on that occasion. The brass band will give a ball and other important arrangements are being inaugurated to make the coming Christmas more interesting than on any former occasion, so the festive young man should engage his best girl and get ready for a jolly time.

A gloom of sorrow and sadness was cast over the community last week as the news of the death of Mrs. Sarah Laird spread about town. The deceased grew from childhood to womanhood on the Coquille, hence she was known by most of the settlers of our valley. The early pioneer can well remember the twin sisters that were so often seen at the store of the old gentleman Rackliff, near the forks of the Coquille river. Mrs. Laird was one of those twins, being a daughter of Mr. Rackliff, sr., and sister to Capt. W. E. Rackliff, one of the leading merchants of our city. Mr. Laird has the sympathy of the community in his sad bereavement. Only four days of sickness brought this apparently healthy lady to her grave.

The entertainment given by the Myrtle Point amateur dramatic association last Saturday evening as a benefit to Mrs. Prey and family was a decided success. The exercises were far better than were expected, as many of the actors had never appeared upon the stage before. At seven o'clock the Myrtle Point brass band struck up with soul stirring music, and the people commenced pouring in until every seat was occupied in Wise & Bender's spacious hall. More seats were provided which were soon filled. Standing room was then in demand, and still the eager crowd came streaming in, until the space was nearly all occupied. As the cadence of music gently died away the curtain arose, and Miss Delia Wise stepped to the front and declaimed a very affecting poem, entitled the Russian Castle, in a very graceful and eloquent manner. During this recitation there was some confusion owing to parties coming in, so that there were some who lost the gist of this gem of literature, however the recitation was ably done and elicited applause. A quartet was then sung by Mrs. Perkins, soprano; Tillie Volkmar, alto; Louis Roberts, tenor and Mr. Perkins, bass, and Charles Stewart at the organ. The farce, "Sarah's young maid" was then introduced. Miss Delia Wise as Sarah; Miss Tillie Volkmar, Mrs. Moggage; Sammy Johnson, Sarah's young man; Miss Laura Wise, Arminta; Charles Stewart, Harry. This play was well performed, and afforded much amusement, and the laugh went round repeatedly, thus causing all to feel glad that they had come to the entertainment. This play has developed the fact that there is some excellent talent which is lying dormant in our city, and no doubt the long evenings of the winter season will develop this gift to the amusement and mutual benefit of our young people. Miss Estelle Volkmar declined John O'Reilly's poem entitled Collins Grave's ride at the bursting of the dam at Williamsburg, Mass., when he warned the people of their danger at the peril of his own life, in an able manner considering the short space of time she had to commit so long a piece. This young lady will become proficient in the art with some practice. Finally all present seemed well satisfied. A good purse was made up for the purpose intended. Bart Green, the manager, deserves credit for untold good he has accomplished in that worthy undertaking. After the entertainment the ball commenced and a more joyous lot of young people never met. They danced until the "wee sma' hours" when all returned feeling no doubt benefitted by this pleasant gathering. W. L. Dixon, John M. Roberts and Mrs. Aimee Miller furnished excellent music for the occasion.

The Bender Family.
A local paper printed a long string of stuff from an ex-member of a vigilance committee that he claimed destroyed the Bender family. The following will be refreshing to the ex-member:
Niles, Mich., Oct. 30.—Mrs. Eliza Davis was discharged yesterday on the charge of grand larceny. During the trial many facts were adduced tending to show that Mrs. Monro (Mrs. Davis' mother), was connected with the Bender murders in Kansas. By her own admission Mrs. Monro has had seven husbands, and a number of them have mysteriously disappeared. Her daughter Eliza insists positively that Mrs. Monro is old Mrs. Bender. Officers from Kansas are satisfied that they have at last discovered the notorious Bender family.

The Governor of Michigan granted the request of Gov. Martin of Kansas for the extradition of Mrs. Monro and Mrs. Sarah E. Davis, and this afternoon Mrs. Monro and Mrs. Davis, in charge of deputy Sheriff L. F. Dick, started for Labette county Kansas, the scene of the York murder.

The parties sent here from Kansas, who were well acquainted with the Benders in Kansas, fully identified Mrs. Davis as being the original Kate Bender, and Mrs. Monro as Mrs. Bender. The fact that officers from Kansas were here had been kept so quiet that their presence was not known until the arrest was made, and they were

about taking the train for Kansas. Their leaving created a sensation. The old lady declared she would not be taken alive: that she would die in her tracks first, but the strong arms of Deputy Sheriff Earl succeeded in leading her into a carriage. At the depot she took the matter very coolly and laughed and joked over her prospective trip. Her daughter was reticent and said stily that her mother was Mrs. Bender, but she was not Kate Bender, and that she would make full disclosures hereafter. She has already implicated under oath the connection of her mother with the Bender murders, but says that another sister, and not she, was Kate Bender, but her identification seems to be complete.

The agricultural department has pronounced a fearful sentence upon the English sparrow. A late report of some 400 pages declares the little fellow is "a curse to such virulence that it ought to be systematically attacked and destroyed before it becomes necessary to deplete the public treasury for the purpose, as has been done in other countries." It advises firearms, traps and poison, the destruction of nests and the disturbance of roosting places, sparrow clubs and shooting matches as measures of extermination. Sparrow pot-pie is also recommended as a capital dish. Seven State legislatures have taken action against the English sparrow.
