City of Mexico, Nov. 10.—Reports are in circulation here that the Mexican government intends to adopt measures against the policy which was proposed by Treasurer Windham of the United States. It is said a duty will be placed upon the importation of American machinery into the Mexican states which will reduce said exportation fully one-half. The importation of American machinery now amounts to \$500,000 per year.

The Pan-American scheme is denounced in the Mexican papers as a gigantic humbug. The French government is said to be behind a project for a permanent exposition of French machinery and manufactures in the City of Mexico and it is supposed to be a scheme to improve the French trade in Mexico.
