The Knights of Labor. Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 18.—The convention of the Knights of Labor to-day went into a committee of the whole on the land question. The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, that land including all the natural resources of wealth, is the heritage of all the people, and should not be subject to speculation; ownership and the use should be the only title to the possession of land; taxes upon land should be levied upon its full value for the exclusive use of improvements.
