Scales.
Yes it's scales I'm going to speak of. You see I've been studying scaleology for just three years and am somewhat learned on the question. In speaking of scales I don't mean Mr. Scales of Coquille City. Oh! no; I don't wish to analyze the old man's pedigree without his permission. It is those they weigh things on that is attracting my attention just now. From close observation I believe this scale business is being put to unholly uses. I have noticed the scales in several mercantile houses in this county are not uniform; do not agree. I know of two such houses each of which have Fairbank's scales of precisely the same class, and yet there is five pounds difference in 180 pounds. I have weighed myself alternately on those two scales many times and unless they have been recently regulated any one can find them as I did five pounds difference. Now suppose a man's weight to be 150 pounds, and suppose he weighs himself on ten scales in one day, each of which varies five pounds, he would gain fifty pounds in one day. Suppose I—being a farmer—sell 100 pounds of bacon to one of these houses. I am to have 15 cents per pound. I lose by their weight \$1.50. I want 100 pounds of sugar. House No. 1 may not have it—may be out, you see—I am compelled to buy at house No. 2 and lose five pounds, or 40 cents. Now, what goes with my \$1.90. Some one is bound to lose by buying and selling over such a fraud. The merchant may be innocent of it, but one thing is sure, the trick is either in the man or the scales.

Silver Collage.
Washington, D. C. Nov. 25.—An interview with William B. St. John, president of the Mercantile National Bank, at New York, contains some remarkable statements, in view of the eastern opposition to the coinage of silver, and says "The subject is in a nutshell if I interpret the laws correctly. I merely propose to enhance the price of silver by doubling the monthly investment of the government for coinage and using one-half the coin resulting to fulfill the promise of the United States by redeeming the legal tender notes in coin." This view, as coming from an eastern monetary authority, has been greatly criticized by Wall street people, but throws the growing sentiment in favor of silver coinage.
