Oakland Letter.
Presuming that you will tolerate humor I will say that the Lurline club in its invitation card issued to its members to meet, says: "You are hereby ordered to appear," and offers among its dainties, "seidlitz powders, tar, hot lard, mucilage and brine, but no chicken fig-a-gee or lice pudding."
One hundred thousand pounds of Thanksgiving turkeys were consumed in Oakland, to say nothing of the immense quantity used in the city.
At this writing Oakland is full of spiritual and medicinal "cure-alls," working wonderful cures in cases where the mind alone is at fault. Recently the "microbe killer" was introduced and before the public mind recovered from the shock a "fakir" drops down in our midst with jugs full of the "electric germicide." At the corner of 14th street and Broadway an electric man with electric side-burns and electric face deals out the famous cure-all, "examination free." Patient enters and is seated; doctor queries: "Do you admit that you are full of germs? Well, then in what portion of your body are the microbes the thickest?" Doctor looks inquiringly for symptoms and asks just one more question: "Have you got much money about you? If so, a jug of my electro germicide would be an admirable remedy for you."

The figure cut by the Chinese population in the affairs of the city across the bay is getting to be intensely interesting if not serious. They are not content to run boot and shoe manufacturers of their profession; cigar makers of their profits; cooks, waitresses and wash-women of their bread, and gardeners of their markets but they put white lives in the balance by shooting at each other in the streets in open daylight; they murder each other in all manner of hideousness; they damn civilization and defy our courts; they smuggle their countrymen as well as opium into the great city without fear or serious check and when an attempt is made to punish them they are a unit to defeat the law; instead of respecting it, they have a contempt for it, and when a murder has been committed and some one must be punished, a few hundred dollars buys a ready substitute and the real criminal goes scot free, as in the recent case of Lew Jing who was shot on the evening of June 17th. Lew Tan Fook swore he saw Chin Sin Wing shoot him. It turns out that Wing is innocent, but was made the victim; that his friends would pay well for his release and at last the real murderer would go free. Wing was convicted of murder, but a new trial will show that Tan Fook the main witness was in Watsonville when the murder was committed.

The facts regarding the Chinese invasion of the United States must be comforting in the face of the fact that nearly everything consumed or worn by them comes from China and every dollar they earn finds its way out of our country forever.
Now, let me give your readers a "pointer" regarding the retail fruit dealers in the larger cities of this state which I have learned after eighteen months experience. First, owing to the stupidity and greed of a majority of the dealers, you can buy California fruit at retail in Chicago and other eastern cities cheaper than at home and of superior quality. The dealers here keep second and third grade half rotten goods which they work off on the traveler at first-class prices. It is a shame and disgrace to a boasted grape country that you cannot get decent fruit to eat. Ten cents per pound is asked for grapes at this writing and the dealer fills your order with the fruit that is about to rot on his hands. This one thing has hurt the state very much and it is difficult to see how the great state tolerates such an outrage upon the public.
Your correspondent is suffering somewhat just now from the announcement a few days ago that "high tea" parties are to rage here

this winter. I suppose the "marine dentists who have been examining the bar at the mouth of the Columbia" will surely attend. Another jaw-breaker is the business card of the Philadelphia Dye Works of Oakland which reads: "We live to dye and dye to live," just as surely as the "Treka Bakery" may be read either way.
Quite a trade in holiday goods for Christmas and the New Year is noticeable at this early date, and many hearts are to be made glad as has been the case so often before.
In my next I hope to be able to give you something more about Oakland.

BANDON.
Thanksgiving day was duly celebrated here with big turkeys and the usual adjuncts in the shape of liquid nourishment, etc. The temperature at noon was 66, and that was higher by some degrees than it was on the 4th of July. This must seem almost incredible to people living in eastern states, where it is stated that upwards of 20,000 sheep were lately smothered in a snow storm and where the snow lay on the ground 7 to 8 feet deep, but such was the fact, and we may add that an old neighbor of ours who is only in his eightieth year passed by on horseback in his shirt sleeves.
Mr. Cartwright lately sold some building lots on Virginia street two of which were bought by Mr. Walker of Randolph who it is said is about to move his brewery down here. This will be a very judicious move on his part as it must necessarily greatly increase his trade.
It will have the purest water to aid in the manufacture of his beer and the situation for trade cannot well be surpassed. Between his brewery at Bandon and Crescent City in California he will not have a single competitor and all the numerous wagons coming up from the various little towns along the coast as well as from the various ranches of which the coast is the outlet, on their way to and from Bandon with their various exports and imports must necessarily pass his door. What then is easier for any of those than to put their full beer barrel on their wagon on their way down, and return with the empty one on their way up.
Captain Parker is constructing an Eiffel tower at Brown's Point opposite Bandon. It will be 75 feet in height and be surmounted by a wind mill. The wind mill is intended to raise water for supplying his tug, sailing vessels, etc.

Mr. Cathcart the county surveyor is very busy surveying building lots, land, etc. It is probable it will take him at least a month to complete his present orders.
Mr. Ballard secretary of the Fishermen's Union has purchased a very attractive site for a residence on Prospect Hill and is about to commence the erection of a stately mansion on it immediately.
Mr. Howell who has been residing for the last three years in Humboldt county, California, has returned. He says there is no place like "beautiful Bandon" and its renowned beach, and adds that all the Humboldt county people that he is acquainted with if they could sell out would come up right away and settle in Bandon and on the Coquille river.
From letters and inquiries made from various places even as far off as the great city of London—the metropolis of the world—we have every reason to expect a great immigration here next spring and summer.
Although snow has fallen in several places in California, ranging from an inch in Siskiyou county to twelve inches in Cisco, we have not seen a single flake here, neither do we expect to do so. This we attribute to the influence of the Japan current which does not flow south of Cape Blanco in Curry county, which is about an ordinary days journey from Bandon. The rain fall there also is said to have been very heavy according to the official report for the last month. Our rainfall was but slightly in excess of the average.

Washington, Nov. 28.—Representative Binger Hermann, of Oregon, who arrived in town a day or two ago from a trip in Mexico, is hard at work making preparations for certain legislation that he intends to bring before congress, as well as matters for which he hopes to secure the necessary attention before other departments in the way of extending mail facilities on the Pacific coast, making public surveys, establishing life saving stations, new light houses, etc. He says he will make every effort also to secure liberal appropriations for the rivers and harbors on the Pacific coast, as he thinks that by water way improvements very much good can be done by a comparatively small outlay of money. Mr. Hermann has secured a pension for Robert Carey of Cottage Grove, Oregon.
