Minneapolis Fire. Minneapolis, Nov. 30.—The Tribune building caught fire to-night and in a few minutes the entire building was ablaze. Fifty editors, printers and others employed on the top floor were apparently shut off from all avenues of escape, and the wildest excitement prevailed. Twelve lives were lost and the loss to the Tribune is a quarter of a million, insured at half that amount. Several other firms occupied the same building which was an eight story tinder box. Aside from one elevator, it had but one means of escape—a stairway, and this, as well as the elevator was shut off by the flames early in the fire.

Blind, Harrison and Silver. Washington, Dec. 3.—Senator Bland, of Missouri, the democratic leader of the silver question says: "The president's message on the silver question is vague and inconclusive. He claims to be a friend of silver, but while he desires it in our circulation, he counsels as little of it as possible, hence he has not coined more than two million dollars per month, thus following in the footsteps of his predecessors. He refers to the views of the secretary of the treasury as to issuing certificates of silver bullion, but we are not informed as to what the plans of the secretary may be, therefore cannot now intelligently criticize the plan. The president is evidently in doubt himself on the subject. It is difficult to understand one who does not understand himself."
