Trees and limbs of timber were falling in every direction. Steve was equal to the emergency and came through all right.

Asber Moore, the superintendent of the Salmon Mountain mines, and Ed Green of Eckly, were in town a few days since. Mr. Moore reports that the company have their flume repaired and will soon be at work. Mr. Green says that there is no question but that the Divilbiss brothers have found a very rich quartz lode, and Mr. G. has had much experience in quartz mining, and his judgement is considered good.

F. P. Hermann is clerking for Wise & Bender. It looks well to see Frank back in his old place again.

**DIPHTHERIA.**—The dread disease, diphtheria, is in town, sure, though it shows no sign of spreading as yet. Mr. and Mrs. Boyle, the first patients in town, are about well. On Wednesday night it was found that Mrs. W. P. Skelly and three of her children were suffering with the disease. Attendants were employed, and the house pretty well quarantined. The death of the youngest child, recorded elsewhere, resulted, but the others are getting along very well. The children of Frank Collier have about recovered, but other complications have nearly claimed the youngest, little George, who has been attacked with violent palpitations of the heart. It is feared yet he will not survive.

## Bellamy and How He has Stirred up the People.

There is a world of dissatisfaction among the laboring people the world over, and it is confidently believed that preconcerted action for a remedy of the existing wrongs is just now on the tapis. To rob the work of the bugbear of its being a school book—a book for study and learning—he has gotten it up in the novel form of a romantic novel, in which the hero goes into a trance and is awakened in the year 2000. By way of parenthesis we will say that the work is none the less meritorious on this account as for example, Christ only spoke in parables and many have seen fit to put a good deal of store by what he said. After coming to his senses the hero of this long sleep found congenial company at hand, and one Dr. Lecter sums him him in a happy way of the changes since A. D. 1837, whence his trance dated from. The new order of things well nigh portrays the modern idea of the millennium, and for this, or some approach to it, was the clamor of thousands of people six months ago; is that of hundreds of thousands to-day, and will be that of millions a year hence at the present rapid rate of increase. The government owned everything, and no money was used. Every person went to school till 21; then worked for the government till 45, when he went on the retired list for the remainder of his life. Millionaires are falling in, and some of the best talent of the country say it is the grandest thing ever promulgated by man.
