WONDERFUL THINGS.

The Devil on the Weather—Its Effect on Coast People.
The floodgates of heaven, the oceans, the seas and lakes all seem to have turned bottom side up and a second deluge has been in progress in this coast country for the past forty days and forty nights. Oregon mists, California vapors and Washington showers are all laid in the shade by this indulgent overflow. The "oldest inhabitant" and potent medicine agent is sought for by old and young for an explanation of this wonderful phenomenon. Weather prophets come at a premium and are considered scarce at that. A few good, reliable, sober, truthful weather prophets could reap a beautiful and unlimited harvest on short notice in this section. We want dry weather prophets and must have them. California and Washington want them too, for they have boasted their last boast about the web-footed Oregonian boys and girls. California feet look like the wings of an albatross and broad shoes, 10x12, are the latest style. Washington feet have an upward tendency and, as if by magic, our feet have disappeared from the Washington citizens' horizon. We are sickening into insignificance and it is ruin must be stopped at all events. Even the Chinese in California and Washington are becoming alarmed at the rapid development of their feet, which bids fair to exclude them from ever returning to their native shores. The deep water vessel captains are on the eve of charging by the foot for their return, rather than by the head or one (queue). We will throw out a hint gratis to the railroad companies if they promise to bring our letters and papers through on time. Make use of California feet for pontoon bridges to run trains across rivers and when the bridges of the company are rebuilt they can be returned to the owners. As there will evidently be a surplus of feet for railroad purposes the extra ones can be used to good advantage leading a trail through the twenty feet of snow on the Coast range. The Oregonian can congratulate himself for possessing webbed feet. The web is a preventative of the feet spreading over an entire 160 acres during a wet spell, but symptoms equally alarming are making their appearance in the shape of meteors from the size of a hand-basket to that of a ten ton vessel. Lightning being a scarce article in these parts, a blazing mass the size of a house flying through the air, has an effect on the minds and sometimes the heads of the natives similar to that of the feet of our neighbors. These meteors make their appearance at unexpected places and at any hour in the twenty-four. In the morning the citizen wakes up to find a twenty acre field of wheat sunk down ten feet and a huge meteor sleeping peacefully on the top. The natives, of the continent from which the meteor came, exercise the greatest care in sending only solid rock to us and we cannot judge the nature of the soil by which it had been surrounded. They are saturated with head-light oil, lighted and turned loose into space depending on our dexterity in dodging them when they settle comfortably in our back yard. Our back yards, and wheat fields in one short minute, are turned into an inexhaustible stone quarry. It is, indeed, rather humiliating to have a homestead or pre-emption turned into a timber claim, and may cause you no end of trouble in proving up at the land office.

At the time you are having your witnesses swear that you are proving up on a homestead, a meteor falls and you have a timber claim. For five years you have labored patiently improving the homestead trying to surpass your neighbors in raising crops, and you return home from proving up to find your land "is more valuable for its timber or stone than for agricultural purposes." This is humiliating indeed. Besides that it brings tears to your eyes to watch a disconsolate ranchman scratching among the debris for his claim, and if he does not wish to lose it altogether he hunts up the county surveyor to run the lines. Sitting down and comparing the California and Washington feet with our meteors we cannot tell any difference, and are at a loss to know which our choice would be if it was left to us for preference. Our jail, calaboose, jug, or more properly speaking, the building the town marshal uses to put people in for solitude, thought or so they can procure a night's rest in quiet, is flooded with water and we think it is time for the rain to stop coming down in torrents. Our street cars are greatly impeded, the electric lights quit as on suspicion about eleven o'clock at night, the overland mail train has gone to sleep on the mountains, the new sidewalk gave up the ghost, the telephone and telegraph wires have gone on general strike. Call a mass meeting and urge the Coquille River Board of Trade provide a remedy for us.

Coos Bay Road Fraud.

Ed. HERALD:—I have noticed much of late in your paper, principally from correspondents, in regard to the county building a plank road or railroad from Myrtle Point to Empire City, and some advocate a road on through to Roseburg. Now I should like a word, and I shouldn't go out of Coos county to prove the points I lay claim to. "Citizen of Coos" in the last HERALD showed the folly of subsidizing railroad, and the wrong that had been done to the people of the United States in the loan to the C. P. and U. P. road; also the—I don't know what to call it—well where we built a railroad for a company called the Northern Pacific. These were certainly very great outrages, but for down right robbery, check and audacity we can't think there is a parallel to the Coos Bay Wagon road swindle. Just think of two counties like Coos and Douglas giving a soulless corporation enough in hand to build a good railroad over the route proposed for building a poor miserable excuse for a wagon that can only be used a short time in the summer, and even then by little else than empty wagons, and giving the company a right to charge figures for tolls over this road that would be decent fare on a railroad the length of the route. We appeal to the people of Coos county if a more audacious outrage was ever known. Our people have settled on and improved much of this land, thinking that it was too flagrant a fraud to ever be fully consummated, and that at some time, they would be able to buy it of the government. Now, that they are out of heart of ever securing it in that way, they have applied from time to time to the company to get whatever right it might have, and have offered as high as \$20 per acre for it. This has not moved the company, who evidently realizing that they have little or no right to it and expect to have to give it up sooner or later refuse to make a deed at any price. But they need not fear. Powers corrupt enough to give it away could be induced to stand by the wrong done the people. It is time the people were looking out for their remaining interests before all are taken away. We hear a \$150,000 plank road over the same route to keep the other! Give up the country and move to Siberia would be more sensible.

Let the two counties build a railroad from Roseburg to the sea. The shipment of coal and lumber would pay for the road in the time mentioned by your correspondents. How much of these would be hauled over a plank road, and why? Does the reader ask why? No, you know that the railroad can carry 200 miles cheaper than the teamer can a distance of five miles. Why, then, put our people off with a plank road that would cost two-thirds as much as a standard gauge railroad, and would require one-third of first cost every ten years for repairs? If states, counties and the nation did not take the interest of these corporations into consideration they would build needed railroads. The fact that they give enough of the people's property for their construction, is evidence that they realize their need. It is a wonder that the American people will be so toyed with; and they wouldn't if the imposition was put on by any other than her own people.
