

LOCAL ITEMS.

Ed Price came up Saturday and is fixing up his shingle mill since the flood has subsided. The damage was probably \$100.

The Nationalist club meets tonight. A nice program has been prepared. A general invitation is extended to all and especially the ladies.

We were in error last week in regard to Mr. W. W. Goble's residence. It never moved a peg in the freshet, and was the only house on the river bank below here till Iowa slough is passed that is standing on its feet.

THE SCHOONERS.—There are six schooners in the river, the Long having arrived Friday and the Cheto Sunday. The Europa got aground at the head of the lagoon, but is probably off and gone to sea by this time.

Hon. A. M. Crawford was in town yesterday. He leaves next Monday for Roseburg to file his bond preparatory to entering upon the duties of the office of receiver of public monies to which important trust he was lately appointed.

Capt. Littlefield has been in town the past three days, but went to the bay this morning. He informs us that the government works at the mouth of the river are O. K. and that there is 24 feet of water as far out as the government rock.

Our estimates of the damages by the flood last week if any odds was too low. The loss on Coos river is said to reach to near \$50,000. The roads and bridges are wrecked on that stream, and unlike the Coquille the current there was very swift badly washing the farms.

Capt. J. E. Lehallier of the bark Roseland, wrecked at Borneo river on the 29th ult., spent last night in town. He has the appearance of a smart skipper and since he was a part owner in the vessel it is safe to say the wreck was unavoidable. The reckoning was lost by defective instruments.

Messrs. Haskins and Holverson came over from the North fork yesterday and report every thing about the same as of old. The mill via Harrington's ranch and did not even get their boots muddy. They say it would be an easy matter to put that route in shape for all sorts of travel.

The foot race of Empire was won by Keene, and much dissipation prevails. It is said it was put on job to rob some poor, unsuspecting fellows who had some money that the other fellows wanted. The last we heard the stakes were yet up and being quarreled over. About \$1900 were staked on the race.

SLIDERS.—No one ever remembers in this county half so many land slides as have occurred this winter. We have heard of no less than fifteen. Two large ones are reported from Sixes—one that took off probably half a section from Mount Avery and another on the main Sixes, the one in which Mr. Carman and others were killed. There were four on the lower river, two on South Coquille and one on Catehing creek, besides many smaller ones.

BODY RECOVERED.—The body of John Thrush, the old gentleman killed at Randolph a week ago last Saturday, was recovered on Thursday last and buried the next day. It seems the old gentleman was sitting in a chair near the fireplace and was killed instantly, being found on the demolished sea. It is evident he was literally crushed, his limbs being broken. The body was only a couple of feet under the dirt and debris of the slide, and not in the slough as it was expected it had been carried.

A Slide in Curry.

Three People Buried in the Debris.

The Victims Are Asa Carman, Mr. and Mrs. Moore—No Bodies Recovered.

The sad news of another horrible land slide dealing death was received here last Saturday. The victims are Asa Carman and a Mr. and Mrs. Moore, and the place of the horrible affair is a point one mile above the crossing of the Port Orford-Eckley trail on Sixes river. Mr. Carman's place was just opposite the Moore residence and it is said that the sites of both houses are covered to a great depth with rock, dirt and timber, leaving no doubt but that the three occupants of the houses, who have been searched for for a week were killed. The slide occurred some distance up the river it is said, and formed a gorge and that broke loose in the night coming down with regular Johnstown fury. The reports are quite meagre, but it is certain that the parties are killed. Mr. Carman is one of the best known men in Curry county, being an old settler and the respect for him was most profound. Moore and wife were aged people little known, having, it is said, been here but a year.

Lyons' mill steamed up yesterday and will soon be cleaned and cleared of dirt and rubbish, preparatory to starting up.

The Del Norte Record states that unprecedented snows have fallen in Northern California. Not a stick of timber is to be seen of the huge forest on the west side of the Sierras; it is a solid bank of snow.

The late storm and flood in Curry county got in its work about the time as in Coos county. The Forbes creek bridge went out and several more are badly wrecked. Many barns were wrecked and the roads are blocked with fallen timber.

NEWS FROM OUTSIDE.

We open our forms to say that news up to the 4th inst. is received from outside. Such terrible floods were never heard of in the Willamette. The Salem bridge is gone and the road is impassable from Roseburg to Portland, the water being over the top of the telegraph poles in places. Independence has suffered greatly. Waves were rippling on front street and cellars submerged at Portland. The Morrison street bridge was threatened with drift, logs and floating bridges. There were 5,000,000 saw logs getting away. At last accounts the Willamette was 5 feet above the '61-2 mark, and still rising. The devastation is huge to contemplate.

On the Columbia the situation was even worse. The railroads are washed out in places, the biggest gone in other places and covered with mountains rock in others. Capt. Poe, an eye witness to construction's train going through a bridge, walked from the Cascade Locks to Portland and he says the company can never think of clearing the track. They will have to move the road to a new route.

A Washington dispatch says Secretary Tracy was burned to death.

River Blocked by Drift. On Friday afternoon an immense amount of drift wood in the shape of huge fir and cedar trees commenced to arrive and lodge in the river in front of Albert Gilman's house, and the blockade formed to a point opposite J. T. Moulton's residence, being very close to a mile in length. It was jammed in so snugly that whole trees, many feet thick, are clear above the water, resting on the main drift. Only for being uneven it is said one could drive a team over it. Before it became so compact the Ceres got nearly to the head of it on her way to Myrtle Point, and her crew worked manfully to get past it that afternoon. Her distress whistle took near a score of boats to her assistance and they brought away her passengers. Next morning the drift had crowded on till she had no opportunity to get through and above it. Since men from Lyons' mill have been working out the drift and saving the best timber. At present rats it will take a long time to get river clear, but it is best since to move it all in a body, if such a thing were possible, it would carry out all mill beams, raft and wharves before it. Meanwhile the up-river steamer lands above and the passengers are given a little exercise in walking to town.

THE CAUSE. It is too plain for any doubt as to the cause of this unprecedented timber gorge. The timber is large and nearly all green with the roots attached and quartz rock is observed in the roots, showing that a mountain has slid into the river. Some of the timber is noticed to be sugar pine which only grows on the extreme upper rivers.
