The S. Danielson got to sea on the 30th ult.

The schooner Fro Trade arrived in this river July 1.

Andrew Hall and family of Marshfield came over Tuesday on a visit to relatives and friends.

What has the board of trade been doing for the past month or so? There are many matters that should engage its attention.

Shedden F. Wilson, Esq., the Marshfield attorney, with his family, came over Tuesday in a private rig for a short respite from his busy desk. He returned in the afternoon.

The mail has changed from the old Coos bay wagon route and comes to this place from Camas valley via Middle Coquille. From here it runs to Sumner and then on to the bay. John J. Baker, our lively man, is carrying it, and has a good passenger trade. He has good stock and outfits.

Capt. Parker informs us that when he took his partner Mr. Doe, to Coos bay on the tug Liberty a couple of weeks since there was quite as much water on the Coquille as on the Coos bay bar. These good depths reported show one thing that a jetty on the north spit would make Coquille bar one of the best in the state.

If we had a steamer running to San Francisco capable of carrying 500 tons of coal it would give an impetus to business on the Coquille that would go on even to other and more extensive enterprises. Such a steamer can be made, and the means for its construction can be raised easily enough if the proper hands are sent out to solicit.

Judge G. M. Dyer and estimable lady returned from a visit to their old home in Iowa on Thursday. This is their first visit since leaving there some thirty years ago. The judge has materially improved in health during the trip. He tells us of the oppressive heat back there and how glad he was to get back to the Pacific coast.

The new steamer Dispatch is the fourth vessel that has been built at this place, and we are happy to state that a three masted schooner will be constructed at this place as soon as the present vessels are completed. Mr. Hens Reed will be the designer and builder of the vessel. The muddle has been completed some time since and some of the timbers prepared.—Bandon Reerder

Being arrested, he was brought down and that evening had his preliminary before Justice Simon who bound him over in \$1500 bonds to appear before the grand jury. He was unable to give bonds and in default was taken to jail at Empire City.

Crop-Weather Bulletin No. 16. Oregon Weather Bureau, co-operating with U. S. Signal Service. For week ending Saturday, June 28, 1890.

WEATHER The cool, cloudy and showery weather of the previous week continued up to to-day. It is now clear and very warm. The weather that has prevailed has been worth untold wealth to the producers of Oregon, and from every section comes the most flattering and encouraging reports. The rains were especially copious in the Willamette valley and along the coast where from 1 to 3 inches fell. In southern Oregon over one inch fell at Roseburg but decreased southward to Jackson county where less than one-half inch fell. In eastern Oregon more than the average June rain-fall has fallen varying from one to two inches. The rains were most opportune and have given new life to all growing vegetation.

CROPS. Fall and early sown wheat is now thought to be past any harm from atmospheric causes. It is filling well and of good quality, stools large and stand very good. The crop will be from present appearances, more than an average one; from Umattilla come reports that it will be the largest crop ever harvested in the county. Later sown spring wheat is coming up and fair yields of good hay crops will be obtained from it. From every section of the Willamette valley reports are encouraging showing an enthusiastic feeling among the farmers. Some clover hay was down when the rains began, and was slightly damaged. Timothy hay has been greatly improved. Oats are doing well. Corn is thriving, but in sections of eastern Oregon the weather is too cool. Hops are growing finely and give promise of a good yield. In Gilliam and Morrow, rye harvest is in progress and yields very good. Codlin moths have not done any damage yet. Spraying is however recommended as a preventative. Peaches and apples short crop in southern Oregon, other fruits very plentiful. The potato yield promises to be the largest in the history of the state. Every section reports them doing finely. Through the stock country, grass on the range is good and cattle are in prime condition. The rain extended through Crook, Grant and other interior counties insuring the hay and grain crop.

The week closes with the most flattering out-look for Oregon crops.

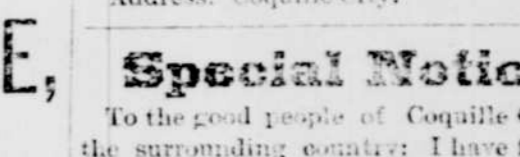

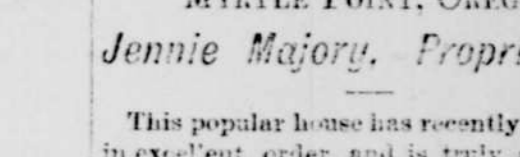
