Bandon on the Beach.

ED. HERALD:—In saying a few words descriptive of Bandon, its position and advantages as a summer resort for those who may seek relaxation from the dust and toil of the interior and the heated term, you, more than any other man in Coos county, can hear me out in saying that I am not given to exaggeration; I leave that for those who may have an ax to grind, and truly, it may be said that their name is legion, and that they are advancing to the front in an alarming resemblance to the scene in Macbeth, where it is announced that "Birnam wood is coming to Dunsinane." My sojourn in Bandon may be transient; nevertheless, I will do it justice in stating that it surpasses in a remarkable degree any of the sea beach resorts on the coast, south of Yaquina and north of Port Orford. On many of the sand-spits in which this coast abounds, the traveler would suffer through lack of fresh water, unless he was prepared with a supply sufficient for a distance of twenty miles; here, on the Bandon beach, south to Floras creek, sixteen miles, there is plenty of fresh water to be had at short distances. Parties are arriving here daily; and, this portion of the county is bound to progress in favor as it becomes better known. I have resided in this section to which I referred above, twenty-eight years, consequently, I believe that I am perfectly qualified to give a fair opinion in the case; "Naught to extimate nor set down ought in malice."

I meet with some old acquaintances occasionally. Isom Clinton is here on business matters, but will leave for Marshfield tomorrow. Charles Moon is here, having been to Port Orford on a business trip, in which he was successful. Ed. Gallier has become a Bandonian and is at work accumulating the shreks. I board at the "Ocean House," noted for good fare; tender beef, ham and eggs are provided daily; in fact, throughout the whole of this Coquille country the people appreciate good living and treat the weary traveler in a way to be remembered, both as regards luxury and price. The boom has no effect on the necessities of life here. According to the bill of fare, the whole of this section of the Coquille, from Camas valley to the sea, is one of the best and cheapest sections of the Pacific coast to travel through. It may be surmised that I am going to deep with this bill of particulars; but, being a free lance, working without aid or hope of a reward, I rest firmly in the belief—the irremovable conviction that, I am delving no deeper than the interest of the traveling public demands. Settlers, with whom I have conversed, are a unit in the opinion that a railroad from Roseburg to Coquille City will aid in bringing in people of means to assist in the development of Bandon and the country adjoining. Sumner residences will be built and the varied industries which are yet dragging their slow length along will receive vigorous propulsion. Here on this Pacific coast, the toil worn immigrant from east of the Rocky mountains may view the glory of setting sun—setting in the west—setting as its beams into the bosom of the great Pacific ocean, but rising in the far Orient. Like him I may say, "my task is ended; my journey is completed; so far, well."
