The measles visited town last week, but so far they have been confined to one family. Grover has kept them pretty well confined, but look out next week.

Mining experts are in our office asking questions about rock and other specimens. Their investigations are going to be of valuable service in the near future.

W. P. Hermann left a fine sample of tobacco that he raised, in Dixon's, Goodnow & Short's sample rooms, last Friday. Wash has demonstrated the fact that tobacco can be successfully raised on the Coquille.

Paul Coke, one of Coos county's most promising young men called at our new office Saturday. He informed this department that a telegram has been received at Empire to the effect that the contract on the Roseburg and Coos bay railroad was shipping from San Diego the fixtures and grading apparatus for doing the work.

Ed Green and George Divilbiss were down from the Salmon Mountain mines last Saturday and report that the prospects for that region are more flattering than ever. Divilbiss Bros. have at least 300 tons of rock now on the dump ready for milling. Some time ago they negotiated for a mill, and expected it to arrive soon, but fears are now entertained that there will be a failure in getting the mill. The boys are so hopeful and have so much assurance that there is "millions in it" that they will continue their efforts to obtain the necessary machinery to work this rich deposit of ore, and thus reap the reward that is so justly due them for their industry on their claims, against odds and ends that required almost herculean strength to overcome. At the present time all attention is turned toward railroads and town sites, and we believe that the mining industries are ignored too much. If the Salmon Mountain and Johnson Creek mines are one-half as rich in deposit as it is firmly believed that they are, the development of this mineral would be of more consequence to the Coquille valley than any other enterprise that now attracts the attention of the minds of the people, from the fact that as soon as gold is being extracted from the quartz there would be thousands of industrious miners prospecting the country. Who knows but that a bonanza yet remains in the hills of the Coquille and the Sixes.

Wagon Road Open. The Middle Coquille wagon road is complete—Whoop la! Now let the teams loose. It will soon be the rainy season and if used much this fall it must be done soon. We now have two wagon roads open to Roseburg.

Arthur Cosgrove made a balloon ascension at Portland last week. He cast loose and started down in a parachute when he could not hold on longer and let that go falling 150 feet. He gasped once and died.

Horrible Tragedy!

Mrs. Frank E. Mackey Blows Her Brains Out.

Coquille City was shocked early yesterday morning to learn that Mrs. Addie Mackey, wife of Frank L. Mackey, had shot herself fatally with suicidal intent. Mr. and Mrs. Mackey had only been married a couple of months and were living at the residence of J. J. Baker by whom Mackey has been employed ever since he came here over a year ago. Mrs. Baker and her children were away on a visit and only her husband and Mr. Baker were at home. The evening previous was spent pleasantly and deceased seemed unusually jolly. Yesterday morning she arose early with her husband and he left her preparing to get breakfast, and went to the livery stable to his work. Soon after Mr. Baker got up, and coming through the front room he found Mrs. Mackey with her face buried in her hands as if in deep meditation or pain. He asked her if there was anything wrong when she told him to go at once and bring Frank to the house. He replied that he would as soon as he tied his shoes, but she insisted that he should go at once which he did. When on the corner by the Universalist church he heard a pistol shot in the house and he rushed back and looking in at a front window he saw her lying on the sofa with blood streaming down her forehead. He ran at once telling the neighbors and her husband, and called Dr. Owen, who was with her in a very few moments. He found that a ball from a 38 calibre pistol had entered her forehead and lodged in the brain. She was still alive, but not conscious. She lived 1 1/2 hours and then expired.

Coroner Butler was summoned and held an inquest at noon yesterday and the verdict was self-inflicted pistol wound with suicidal intent. Poor husband is distracted.

Several changes have been made by the treasury department in the form of the debt statement issued for July. The Pacific railroad 6 per cent. bonds and the navy pension fund 3s, which have heretofore appeared under the head of "interest-bearing debt," are no longer to appear in the debt statement under that head. This reduces the aggregate of the interest-bearing debt to \$700,799,360. Under the head of "debt bearing no interest" legal-tender notes and old demand notes, heretofore lumped in one sum, are discriminated, and the balance of the fund on deposit with the treasurer of the United States for the redemption of notes of national banks, \$54,207,975, is included. The gold, silver and currency certificates are set off by themselves under a sub-head. The fund held for the redemption of United States notes appears under the head of "cash in the treasury." What has hitherto been known as "net cash in the treasury" now appears as the "net cash balance," and in it are included the \$54,207,975 national bank fund deposited under the act of July 14 last. The amount of the debt, less cash in the treasury, is decreased under the new form of statement to \$876,389,113, which represents a decrease for the month of \$395,257.
