The Seattle Press says: "According to the law of this state adopted by the Australian system of voting, not more than 250 votes should be cast in the same precinct. Should there be more than that number they will be received, but the precinct must be divided before the following election. No peddling tickets allowed. The names of all candidates are printed on each ballot. No voter is entitled to more than one ballot. On receiving the ballot the voter retires to one of a number of booths, furnished for that purpose, and prepares his ballot. He may either vote a straight party ticket by striking out the names of all parties except the one he desires to vote, or he may vote a mixed ticket by striking out every name except one candidate for each office. After the ballot is prepared it is properly folded and deposited in the box. Thus no person has any means of ascertaining for whom any other person voted.
