Joe Radabaugh read an extract from "Freethought" giving the expenses of congress, which, if true, portrays a wretched state of affairs in the senate chambers of our boasted free and republican government. An adjournment was soon had and all repaired to the beautiful grove near the pavilion where the speaking had been done, and partook of an excellent picnic dinner. After the dinner was over and an hour was occupied visiting among friends the Myrtle Point brass struck up one of their excellent airs in the pavilion which called the large mass of people together again, and Mrs. Kregel gave an address taking up the subject of liberalism. Her arguments sustained in a good degree the position taken by liberals without the abuse of churches or orthodox doctrines so common to speakers on this subject. Not a word seemed to drop from her lips that could offend the most zealous Christian, unless reason or argument should be a cause of dissatisfaction.
