Judge Dyer visited our city last week.

Atty. Sherwood was in town the fore part of the week.

Rev. McLean delivered two very interesting sermons Sunday morning and evening.

We notice the pleasant countenance of J. T. Moulton on our streets quite often of late.

We notice many home-seekers visiting Lewellen & Co's real estate office. They are lively and wide-awake men and will succeed.

We heard persons who came from the interior a few days since remark that J. W. Wimer's cheese was the best that they had tasted in Oregon.

Since Rufus Horton and Allen Dodge have given the finishing touches with their paint brushes to Hon. J. H. Roberts' dwelling, it presents a beautiful appearance.

When Sol Wise presents this department with one of those fine hats he has in his store we will mention it in these columns and wear it down to the railroad front, and not before.

Brown's school house is receiving a new coat of paint externally and internally. When Lewis Strong and Ben Shull are directors, look out for needed improvements as they will be done.

Two lines of stages are now running from this place to Roseburg. James Laird has been in town several days making ready to carry out his mail contract and convey passengers over the Middle fork road.

Ye scribe visited J. W. Wimer's new building Sunday evening. It is approaching completion and is an elegant structure and is an ornament to the city. A few more such men as Mr. W. is what we need to build up the town.

The threshing machines are starting up and one run has been made at Daniel Giles' farm three miles above town. 80 bushels of barley and 70 bushels of oats to the acre was the result. The Coquille valley takes the cake.

The Enterprise Brass Band had advertised quite extensively that they would give a social dance on Saturday, Aug. 30, but owing to the funeral of Mr. and Mrs. Major Roy Majory, the band postponed the party until Saturday evening, Sept. 11th.

Samuel Giles, the indefatigable brick manufacturer, has been confined to his room several days because of over-work. It is hoped he will soon be around, as his services are greatly needed in laying up the new kiln now ready to be fired.

George Guering was down last week from Eckley. He is still enthusiastic about the Salmon mountain mines, and he sent this department some specimens of quartz after returning home that Mr. Goodnow, the assayer, pronounces the best rock he has seen that came from that district.

From the movements of Isaac Billings, one of our real estate brokers, we judge that he will soon appropriate some of his city property to his own use. If so, we trust that he will build a nice cottage, raise a flower garden, keep a poodle and a dog cart, and after a while a rockaway carriage. That will be very nice, friend Ike.

Hon. J. H. Roberts will put me mechanics at work on his brick building on the 2nd inst. This will be the first structure of the kind in the Coquille valley. The brick school house will soon follow and Hon. B. Hermann will be ready ere long to erect a fine large structure on the southeast corner of First and Spruce streets. "We are marching along."

C. H. Fisher, of the Roseburg Review, called at our sanctum one day last week. He had been to Coos bay for health and pleasure combined. He claimed to be gaining in strength and has already arrived at Roseburg and published a very able and truthful article on Coos bay. We have noticed a certain candor in the Review that helps to place it among the first-class journals in Southern Oregon.

D. Giles brought a sample of his brick to our office last week that is as good or superior to any pressed brick ever brought to this place from San Francisco. It measured 8 1/2 inches in length (plump) 4 inches wide and 2 1/2 inches in thickness. The sample was as square and true as if it had been dressed with a plane and we understood that the whole kiln just burned is like the sample. They are sold at the yard for \$8 per thousand.

John Berry who has been farming two miles above town for the last 14 years states that his crops are better this year than they ever have been; in fact he claims that crops on his place this season are better than he ever saw anywhere. Mr. Berry has a lovely farm, fine orchard, good home and is in a way to prosperity. He expects to start to Central Point in Jackson county with his celebrated Billy Berry and other fine horses he has raised, to attend the district fair, in a few days. Coos county can well be proud of such exhibition of stock raised within her borders, and we expect "Billy" will come back with many laurels.

When Dick Braden brought his four house stage up in front of the Myrtle Point hotel last Wednesday evening we heard a familiar voice and rushed across the street to learn from whence it came, and found T. Manuel Hermann shaking hands with friends and kissing his "cousins and his aunts." By his letters of recent date Mr. Hermann had left the impression on the minds of his friends that he was very weak and delicate so one can imagine the surprise in seeing him in robust health or looking like a corpulent Dutchman. Mr. Hermann is at the head of the western division of the Pension bureau at Washington and will return in a few weeks to his duties. Manuel has helped to open up the Coquille valley and his many friends are glad to see him enjoying good fortune.

DIED.—Aug. 30, at one o'clock a. m. in Myrtle Point, Oregon, Roy Majory, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Majory, jr., aged 10 months. Little Roy was a bright and lovely child and a "pet of the household." He suffered five days and his heroic efforts to baffle the dreaded disease and conquer the mystic hand of death was a wonder to all present. The last two days before his innocent spirit took its flight it seemed that the thread of life was at its highest tension and was ready at any moment. Nearly every matron in town visited the little sufferer and tried their utmost to alleviate the agony and distress of the sweet child but all in vain. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. Easter at the Progressive Baptist Church. A large concourse of sympathizing friends followed the remains to the cemetery.

Thomas Sheridan, Major Miller Geo. Flanagan, and Mr. King, visited this place Friday remaining over night. They came up to obtain the right-of-way for the Roseburg-Coos Bay and Eastern railroad. W. L. Dixon, Z. T. Johnson and Orville Dodge had been out soliciting the right-of-way, by order of the board of trade, with good results. We found some places where the railroad would play havoc with building places, and domestic arrangements generally and even then people were willing to give the right-of-way with only sufficient pay to move their buildings and repair other damages to their homes that some of them had been struggling to build up for a decade or more. With one or two exceptions the farmers are willing to encourage the railroad and exert every nerve to forward the interests of the road. So that practically the right-of-way is secured between this place and Coquille City. The Coquille Valley Board of Trade will meet Sept. 2 and at that time steps will be made to devise some means to raise funds to pay for moving such buildings. President Sheridan and party returned to Marshfield Saturday and they were well pleased with the result of their visit. It is surprising to see the difference in people, for while some are actually damaged as above stated there are others that are not in the least hurt by the construction of the road and yet the latter class are the first to kick and one man stated that a railroad would not benefit this country and that tin es were better 25 years ago before there were any improvements in the country. Thank heaven there are but few such men in the Coquille valley.

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THE RAILROAD GOES!

Last Saturday at conference of the leading citizens of the county in the railroad matter, at this place, it was found that so few remained to give right-of-way that it was deemed expedient to commence suit against them and let the work go on. Mr. King was to inform Mr. Graham by telegraph that day and if favorable all necessary material would be shipped at once; otherwise a shut down and all hands stop work. Favorable report was sent, and it is fair to presume that in two weeks the line between Coquille City and Marshfield will be literally covered with men and machinery working with a will. Manager King, Major Miller, J. W. Bennett, T. R. Sheridan and E. G. Flanagan were the boys that set the matter in motion. They went to the bay Saturday afternoon.
