A strong effort is being made to raise funds to erect a Presbyterian church at this place.

Three of Daniel Giles' family have been suffering from sore throats since the funeral of their lost child, but they are convalescing.

The Percheron and Clydesdale stallions attracted attention and admiration at the fair, and the owners of these splendid horses have reason to be proud. They took first premiums.

Quartz supposed to contain gold, silver and copper has been discovered on Will Hood's ranch, twelve miles above town on the South branch of the Coquille river, samples which can be seen in the cabinet in our office.

J. W. Wimer's cheese at the fair has been spoken of in the highest terms by those who sampled it. This has proven that Coos county can compete with the world in the manufacture of this useful and staple commodity.

Our city has been crowded every night during the fair, as all that could find accommodations came up evenings and stopped over night. Every team and hack available was out on the road each morning and evening to convey passengers to and from the fair grounds.

Rev. McLean brought to our office a piece of lignite coal from a ledge near Riverton that is pronounced very good by parties who have had much experience in coal mining. As the railroad construction progresses prospecting will be done and no doubt Coos county will be the wealthiest section in the state within the next decade.

A little child of Isaac Coy's seven months old, died Saturday night at C. B. Marsters' on Catching creek. The little one's mother died at Rogue river a few weeks since, and Mr. Coy brought the babe to Mrs. Marsters for care. The death was very sudden, there being no apprehension of any danger until it was too late to send for medical aid.

George Camman and George Wilson, of Empir-City, have been taking in the fair and having a splendid time with Myrtle Point musicians. They played leading instruments in the Band at the fair, and with Miss Georgina Camman furnished the music for the ball in the pavilion Saturday night. These young people have hosts of friends in this vicinity.

As we close this department we are informed that Mrs. D. Giles is afflicted with sore throat, and it is believed by the family and many others that it is the diphtheria that is going the rounds in the home of these people. The doctor attending has pronounced the complaint that dread disease, while others have disputed it. Every precaution is taken to stop the disease. A little caution costs but little.

Gen. Fremont Post, G. A. R. was mustered in at this place by Hon. W. Sinclair last Saturday evening, Sept. 8, 1890 with the following officers: J. H. Roberts, post commander, J. P. Easter, sen. vice com.; A. H. Snyder, jr. vice com.; S. H. Miller, chaplain; Jas. Walsh, officer of the day; John Millinburger, officer of the guard; T. M. Hermann, surgeon; Orville Dodge, adjutant; Conrad Haradon, quartermaster.

Newt Divilbiss passed through town last Wednesday having come down from the Salmon Mountain mining district. We were shown a beautiful gold brick made into a breast pin that he had taken from quartz that came from the Divilbiss brothers' lode, that gave an assurance that there is gold in that mining district. The brick was 1/2 of an inch thick, 1/2 an inch in length and 1/2 of an inch wide. The company has the lumber on the grounds to build 1000 feet of flume and other arrangements are being made to put in two arrastras and we expect when they are in operation that results will astonish many who have not visited that section.

Mrs. F. M. Decker has taken charge of the Lehnerr house and has had a rush of customers ever since. This is evidence that the house is well kept.

Bids are being forwarded from this place to W. B. King, superintendent of construction for the Coos Bay and Roseburg railroad, proposing to furnish ties for that road.

Although the exhibition of stock at the fair was small, yet it is remarked that what was shown was as good as can be found in the state. It is also conceded that the ladies of Coos county did a noble and excellent part toward embellishing the pavilion with their fancy and useful needle work; in fact their efforts and that of the Wimer family and a few other settlers on Halls creek, redeemed the exhibit in the pavilion from a total failure, and it seems to us that the farmers of this valley have made a great mistake in not taking in specimens of their products at this time when there were so many strangers among us examining the country. There will much fruit be allowed to decay under the trees this year in this valley and on the hillsides, that is far superior to any that was shown at their fair, and yet those who brought fruit deserve credit for the effort they made. It will require a few more wide-awake and thrifty farmers to settle in this valley before a successful and interesting fair can be held, and when they come and buy out some of the selfish and sleepy tillers of our rich and productive soil, it will be "the survival of the fittest" and Coos county will then exhibit as fine stock and farm produce as any county on the Pacific coast.

On Thursday last Mr. C. W. Von Pegert an old-time resident of this county, fell from the second staging of the gin of his pile driver while driving piles at Pershbaker's mill and was crushed on the deck below, living but a few seconds. He was never conscious, and it is thought his neck was broken by the fall. Three or four persons saw him fall, and they say that he was standing on a scantling 2x4, when a boom that was hanging by a rope, and which he had disturbed, swung against him striking him in the breast and knocking him off his footing. It seems that he made no effort to catch hold of anything.

The funeral took place on Saturday at the Odd Fellows' cemetery, Coquille City, being conducted by that order, of which he was a member.

Deceased was near fifty years of age and leaves a wife and two sons to mourn his untimely demise, and a host of friends who learn with deep regret that he is gone. He was a good man and one of the most useful citizens Coos county has ever had.
