Horrible Disaster.

SPOKANE FALLS, Sept. 7. The dreadful explosion of dynamite at the Northern Pacific yards last night was the all engrossing topic of conversation in the city to-day. Curiosity caused hundreds to visit the scene of the accident, and during the search eager crowds watched the work of removing the immense amount of rocks thrown down by the explosion into the cut below, under which most of the bodies of those killed have been found. The scene of the explosion presented a fearful appearance. On top of the ledge of rock where James McPherson was tamping the blast, by the explosion of which so many were hurled into eternity, a deep hole was excavated, and it is estimated that 2500 cubic feet of rock and earth were hurled upon the unfortunate men directly beneath the cut. The explosion was a terrific one, it being stated that 150 pounds of dynamite were in each of the two blasts discharged. Although a large force of men were kept at work until all the rock dislodged by the premature blast was removed no more bodies were found. The number of dead found last night was fourteen. In addition to these one man died from the effects of his injuries at the hospital to-day, and it is also reported that two others who are badly injured have died at their homes during the day. Many of those injured were so badly hurt that recovery is almost impossible.

General foreman Charles Bolt states that forty-two men were in the gang working on the cut in that ledge. Of the number fifteen are dead, eight are in the hospital and it is not yet been determined whether the remainder of the other men were hurt. Of these many are supposed to be hurt, and will probably be present at roll call to-morrow. Until then the number of missing cannot be determined. Funeral services will be held to-morrow at ten o'clock at the morgue over the remains of the fifteen already dead, and a public burial will be given.

National Farmers Alliance and Industrial Union. What it is.
 Ed. HERALD.—Having been appointed organizer for the N. F. A. and I. U. in this state it becomes my duty to set forth our objects, aims and intentions. First, "to labor for the education of the agricultural and laboring classes in the science of economic government in a strictly non-partisan spirit." The Farmers' Alliance is conspicuous as an organization that is strictly non-partisan and yet known to exert a powerful influence upon the politics of the country. Non-partisan is generally misunderstood, Webster says: "Partisan is being devoted to party; especially being devoted too exclusively to one party;" in other words being a slave to party; we are therefore abolitionists (white as well as black). Now it follows that the prime object of this association is to better the condition of the farmers and laborers of America, mentally, morally and financially, to suppress personal, sectional and national prejudices, all unhealthy rivalry and selfish ambition; to return to the principles on which this government was founded, by adhering to the doctrine of equal rights, and equal chances to all, and special privileges to none; to educate and commingle with those of the same calling, to the end that the life of the farmer and laborer may become less lonely and more social, to assist the weak with the strength of the strong, thereby rendering the whole body more able to resist, and to bequeath to posterity conditions that will enable them as honest, intelligent, industrious producers, to cope successfully with the exploiting class of middlemen."

As to the success of this order I will only state, that at the St. Louis meeting last December, where it consolidated with the K. of L. and other labor organizations, it was over two million strong; it has since nearly doubled in the states then organized, besides there are 7 or 8 more states organized since. It is now estimated at 4,000,000. Exerting a political power in both parties for the good of the people in opposition to monopoly and trusts, it is now conceded that the alliance with the aid of the K. of L. and other labor unions will elect this fall 4 governors of states and a number of congressmen, estimated at from 40 to 100, many of whom will have no opposition, all without going outside of the two old parties; these will be pledged to vote for all measures for the people, and not for the money power alone, as has heretofore been the rule.

Now as to membership, all persons over 16 years of age believing in the existence of a Supreme Being who rules and governs the universe, and being a farmer, a laborer, a mechanic, a country doctor, country school teacher, or mill hand are eligible to membership. Persons engaged in the following occupations are excluded: Merchants, bankers, brokers, lawyers, city doctors, preachers and school teachers, land agents, book agents, peddlers, canvassers, livery stable men and all millowners and bosses, all dealers, speculators and gamblers and all others whose greatest interests do not harmonize with farming and labor.

Any persons eligible to membership will be furnished with all the information and literature we can furnish by applying to the undersigned who will lecture on the objects, aims and benefits of the order, who ever called on if consistent with his time and ability to do so, whenever requested by a respectable number of citizens, so to do, *Deo favente.*

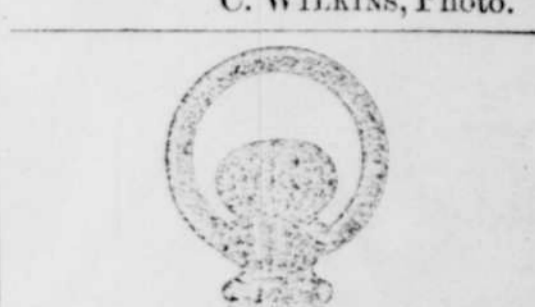
