The West is kicking the Farmer's Alliance because it has taken up the political cudgel. If the editor of that paper or anyone else will give the matter a moment's thought it can't be otherwise than plain that that is their only salvation. Organization without action would not avail anything. Mr. West, would you have them a mutual admiration society only? They should study politics—the science of government—and see that no noxious laws are foisted on them. When they take interest in the laws of the country they are dabbling in politics. This you would deny them, a prerogative that every good citizen should be proud of and exercise. We believe we understand you now that we have brought the matter down to a logical conclusion; you object to their united action, for we cannot imagine a sane man would deny them the right to exercise the elective franchise. United they could accomplish something. It is fear of this that prompts this kick. Monopolists and enemies of the laboring man advocate the same. Thus you have put yourself on record as an enemy of the farmer; else been too hasty in your conclusions.

Public Control of Railroads.

Where to draw the line in determining what the public should own and administer is what frightens many as soon as this question comes up. We are not quite sure that any permanent line need be drawn; it might be as well to leave the line, as it will be left anyhow, to be adjusted for each case by itself, and let the public needs and expediency settle the matter. But if a line must be drawn, we suggest that it be drawn so as to include within public ownership all those industrial systems which require from the public special grants and exclusive privileges. This would include railroads, telegraph lines, express companies, street car lines, elevated railroads, canals, bridges, docks and wharfs, in addition to those already under public control, such as water-supply, light-supply, the common highway and the postal system. The objection that this is a long step toward socialism is met by the common sense reply that we have already taken long steps toward socialism since the days of feudalism and no one wants to retrace these steps; if another step in the same direction is likely to prove equally satisfactory why not take it? We don't have to take two steps if we find that one is a mistake. This idea that a thing desirable in itself should not be done because it is "in the direction" of something conceived to be dreadful, is on a par with the man who should decline to go to Philadelphia from New York because it was on the route to San Francisco. A more formidable objection is the one that our civil service is now an immense partisan machine, and to double its size is to double the danger arising from partisan manipulation. We are persuaded that a non-partisan civil service must be firmly established, including the postal system, before such a step can be taken as public administration of railroads. But we are equally sure that the step will be taken before long; it is simply a question of time and patience. From the West chiefly comes the momentum that will carry us to that step. The Knights of Labor and the Farmers' Alliance are already substantially united on it.

Topics of the Farm

It is best to dig potatoes as soon as fully ripe.

Begin to get rid of your poor stock and to prepare for winter.

When you buy farm machinery buy the best—and take care of it.

Lay shingles a quarter to half an inch apart, if you want them to last well.

More tillage and less acres, not more acres and less tillage, is what is needed.

It is economy to dispense with fences as much as possible, and it is convenient.

Place wire hooks at convenient and safe points in the barns to hang lanterns on.

Farm work is hard work; but who can take a leisure day and feel it less in his business than the farmer?

When you dig your potatoes, dry them before storing, but do not expose them to the sun, if you can avoid it.

When threshing take good care of the straw. Bright, clean straw is better for bedding as well as for feeding.

As a rule, it is better to sell grain when ready for market, than to stand the loss from shrinkage by holding for higher prices.

There is a difference between routine and regularity. The first is blind imitation, the other the result of intelligent system.

All root crops should be thoroughly sweated and dried before being stored. If buried in piles in the ground, give them but a light covering of dirt until winter is about to begin, and until that time, leave an opening at the top, filled with straw, for ventilation.
