DIED.—Joseph M. Whitesell, one of Coos county's thrifty farmers died at his home on Rhoda's creek last Friday afternoon aged about 64 years. Some two weeks since Mr. W. was sowing grass seed on the side of a hill and when stepping over a log he broke one of his legs, since which time he had been quite unwell, besides the natural debility caused by the fracture. Mr. Whitesell did not actually believe that the limb was fractured, and he procured some crutches and endeavored to walk around, but soon sent for Dr. Brower who had set his leg and

it was found necessary to put it in place again which was done in plaster of Paris. The patient began to fail in general health and last Friday J. J. Woods, his attendant went to Conrad Miller on an errand and on returning in company with Dr. Brower, they found that the spirit had taken its flight. Justice Bender was immediately notified, but as there were no suspicious circumstances surrounding the case there was no inquest held and Sunday the remains were brought to town and laid away to rest in the cemetery.

Mr. Whitesell came from California to Coos county about six years ago and took up a pre-emption claim on Rhoda's creek and cleared 80 acres the first year and proving up he entered a homestead and has cleared and fenced at least 100 acres of that, making in all 180 acres well set in grass fenced and stocked. The deceased came from Alleghany Co., Pa., near Pittsburg and has relatives living at that place. He was somewhat uncouth or rough in manners, but he was always ready to assist the afflicted in distress, and many noble deeds are often related where he has given money freely to assist the sick or distressed. FATAL ACCIDENT.

Another Victim of Carelessness.

The Middle fork community have been shocked the third time by the untimely death of one of a hunting party who were out hunting in the vicinity of Yellow creek. Mr. Samuelson, George Dye and Myron Taft were the party. The latter's gun (a 44 calibre Winchester) was accidentally discharged and the ball took effect in the groin of George Dye. The bullet passed through the kidneys and lodged against the skin near the backbone. This happened about 10 o'clock a. m. Thursday, Oct. 2, and the poor fellow suffered excruciating pain until about 3 o'clock Friday morning when death relieved him of his terrible suffering. Less than one year ago L. Samuelson was killed near the place where this young man lost his life, while out hunting, it is supposed by the accidental discharge of his own gun. The present victim is the third on the Middle fork within a few years and the question arises can there be anything done that will teach careless people to be careful when handling firearms. The body of the young man was brought to town and placed in J. L. Lewellen's undertaking rooms and after being placed in a casket it was removed down the river and sent to his home at Coquille City.

A gentleman called at our office Sunday evening who has traveled considerable and he discussed the situation as follows in regard to building up towns: He thinks that those owning lands in towns should open the streets, burn out the stumps and even put down sidewalks. He says there is nothing that will induce strangers to invest in a town more than evidence of enterprise on the part of land owners, because if they don't push ahead the progress of the town is blocked. Good streets are the great incentive for people to settle and invest. Pure water fountains or hydrants at convenient places are another great inducement and the founders of towns succeed in proportion to their enterprise in these directions. He says that he has seen towns that did not advance scarcely any in improvements for years, but the property would finally change into the hands of some enterprising and liberal minded men and they would give lots away with the condition that certain improvements were made and the place would spring up into a city composed of energetic people. He believes that Myrtle Point would become a place of much importance if it was managed in this way, owing to the excellent farming lands in its vicinity.

The New Ocean Steamer.

We are much pleased to be able to furnish the information that the long talked of and much needed ocean steamer to ply between this port and S. F. is practically assured. Bandon's ship yard, which, since its establishment has been almost steadily occupied, will within three weeks present again a scene of activity, and the hum of industry will gladden the ear of the progressive citizen. Cap. Harkins, who has designed and probably will control the new craft, was here this week and effected arrangements for the construction with our famous builder, Capt. Hans Reel. Captain Reed has the model completed and will at once proceed with work on the patterns and when these are ready, will put a small crew at the frames, etc. The new approach of the rainy season will necessitate a shed covering, and will probably delay the vessel's completion to some extent the purpose being to launch her about the first of May next.

The steamer will be 150 feet in length, 33 feet beam, and 10 feet depth of hold. This, it is estimated, will give her a coal carrying capacity of 400 tons on a water draft of 9 feet. The Fulton Iron works will furnish the machinery, which is of the latest design and great power, the company guaranteeing twelve knots. She will carry compound engines (12x24x20) with 20 inch stroke and operate independently two 7 1/2 foot propellers. Passenger accommodation will be first-class for 30 in the cabin and 10 in the steerage.

It is the desire of the originators that at least half the stock be taken on the river, so that continuance in this trade be assured, but San Francisco capital will build her, should our people decline to invest in the enterprise. The estimated cost of the vessel is \$40,000.—Bandon Recorder.
