

RAILROAD NEWS. Latest Developments in the Roseburg & Coos Bay Line.

Manager R. A. Graham will reach Roseburg to-morrow morning from San Francisco and leave immediately for Coos bay. He has procured a large force of Chinamen for grading who have been shipped from the city by steamer. Reports from Marshfield are to the effect that work is going on along the line as reported in last week's Review. The force is being increased just as fast as it is possible to secure men. The surveyors who have located the line to Myrtle Point or near there, have been taken off from that part of the work. It is intended to put on the surveyors to locate the line through the canyon above Myrtle Point out to Roseburg in about four weeks. The location through the canyon will be the most difficult piece of engineering work on the road and the best of engineers will have charge of it. Forty miles of steel rails purchased in Philadelphia were shipped by water from that city for Coos bay three weeks ago and are expected to arrive there shortly.—Roseburg Review.

From Sleep to Death.

Syracuse, Oct. 16.—What has proved to be the most disastrous fire that has visited Syracuse for many years was discovered in the Leland hotel at 12:30 o'clock this morning. It is now 2 o'clock and the fire is still burning fiercely, although the entire fire department, consisting of nine engines, are working hard to save further loss of life and limb. An eye-witness is positive that at least 25 persons lost their lives and many more are injured.

One woman was being lowered from a window by the aid of ropes. She had reached a point opposite the third story when the rope became ignited from a burning sill. The rope parted and the woman fell to the pavement. Her brains were dashed out and her body flattened into a shapeless mass.

So great is the confusion and excitement that identity of those who are killed and injured is wholly unknown. Undertakers and ambulances are flying in all directions, and the streets in the neighborhood of the ill-fated hotel are thronged with crowds of people.

Frank Carey of Glen Falls, N. Y., has been identified as one of those who were burned to death. Many people, crazed with fright, lost their lives by jumping from the windows. One man says he saw six people jump from different windows on the Fayette-street side of the building within a space of four minutes, and the sight sickened him with its horrors so that he was compelled to leave the spot. The building was provided with both iron fire escapes on the outside and ropes on the inside, which were the means of saving many lives.
