The president of Mexico has decreed that an impost of \$500,000 shall be levied upon the distilleries of alcoholic liquors for the next fiscal year.

In the city of Fort Worth, Texas, 1500 arrests of women were made in the last year, nine-tenths of the number, at least, for drunkenness.

The Central Council of Trades Unions, Minneapolis, has taken action condemning vinegar factories for using old whisky barrels in which to supply vinegar, as they are found to be poisonous.

The schools of Riverside, Cal., have presented the W. C. T. U. superintendent of the scientific temperance instruction a written test of the degree of instruction given the pupils on the subject of narcotics.

Of the ninety-four members of the Canadian provincial parliament, recently elected, sixty-three are pledged to vote for the prohibitory law in case the courts decide the test case in favor of the province.

Mrs. Mary H. Hunt addressed the national educational association, recently convened at Asbury Park, New Jersey, on compulsory temperance education as related to "The Perpetuity of American Institutions."

Four woman physicians have been appointed by the board of health of New York as members of the corps of fifty doctors to visit the tenement houses, and give free treatment to the poor in need of medical aid.

The Massachusetts legislature adopted an investigation law, giving the state bureau of statistics \$5000 with which to conduct an investigation of the relation of the liquor traffic to crime, pauperism, and insanity.

Governor Tillman, of South Carolina, has ordered the reopening of the liquor dispensaries of that state on the first of August, a change in the supreme court procuring a reversal of the decision that the dispensary law is unconstitutional.

The National Editorial Association in session at Asbury Park, New Jersey, condemned the practice of accepting advertisements of immoral tendency. Such a step toward a purer press is an honor to the association and cause for great rejoicing.

The Westminster Gazette, England, notes the organization of a new temperance society among the legal profession, called the Royal Courts of Justice Temperance Society. It promises to become an important branch of the temperance army.

A course of lectures at the Royal Institution which has created much interest is that by Captain Abney, on color blindness. Excessive tobacco smoking has long been known to be an important factor in color blindness, and Captain Abney indorses the truth of this observation.—Scientific American.

Dr. Anderson Brown, one of the foremost women physicians of England, has established an industrial farm for imberiate women. The test of the practicability of outdoor life as a cure of drunkenness will be made under the auspices of the Women's Temperance Association. Fruit growing, poultry raising, gardening, bee keeping and butter making will be among the branches taught.

The W. C. T. U. monthly responsive reading for August is on the department, Securing Homes for Homeless Children. It has been prepared by Miss Lucia Kimball at the request of the national superintendent, who hopes it may have a wide circulation and find place during the autumn meetings of unions which do not meet in August. Mrs. Merrill reports the work of Oregon and southern California unions in this department very encouraging.

Eight thousand of the twelve thousand saloonkeepers in New York city have served terms in prison. Yet license have been issued to them as men of "good moral character."

ED. HERALD: I notice in a late issue of your paper a communication from Mr. J. M. Lasswell, in answer to my article on "Government Ownership of Railroads," etc. I have not the time at present to answer the article as it deserves, nor neither perhaps has your readers the time and patience to read all we might write on this subject. But I feel it due to Mr. Lasswell to acknowledge his article and accord him due credit for the fair and liberal manner in which he has replied. I say liberal, for I feel that he has been liberal in quoting so much of my article; in fact I think he has quoted rather more than he has answered.

He claims that newspapers are run by the government and that he, as an editor, would only publish one side of the question. If I understand this proposition, it simply means that the party in power would use the papers to advocate its own interest. And now I would ask if any other business that the government might control? Would they not use it to advance their own interest and for their own benefit?
