The Jetty—M. Nickam, one of the contractors for extending the jetty, came last Sunday, and a pile-driver and a quantity of material arrived on the Bandorville last Wednesday. Mr. Nickam is getting ready and thinks that he will be able to start the work with a full crew in about three weeks.

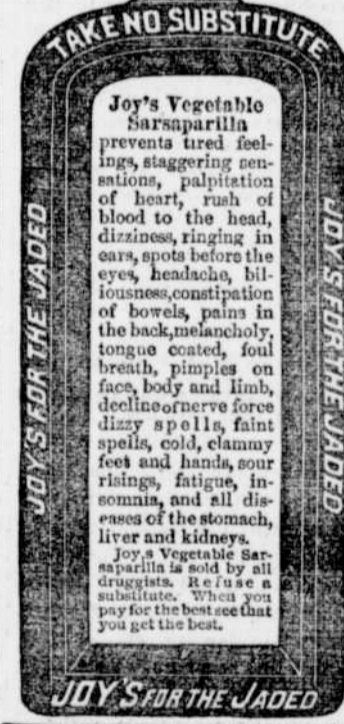
