Temperance Notes.

[From the National W. C. T. U. Bulletin.] Bishop John H. Vincent and Rev. John Hall, D.D., have become counsellors of the department of purity in literature and art of the National W. C. T. U.

Hope Mission and Reading Room for Scandinavians, under the conduct of the Chicago Central Union, holds gospel temperance meetings every evening; 27,375 people attended the meetings last year.

Temperance puts coals on the fire, meal and flour in the barrel, money in the purse, credit in the country, contentment in the house, clothes on the children, vigor in the body, intelligence in the brain, and spirit in the whole constitution.

Rev. Dr. Henry C. Lann, who is visiting America in the interest of the famous Grindelwald Conference in Switzerland and the Convention of the World's W. C. T. U. in London next June, was present in Washington at the great meeting arranged for the presentation of the polyglot petition to the president and congress of the United States on February 16th.

Miss Alice R. Palmer, of India, the fifth round-the-world missionary of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, sailed from Southampton on the American Line steamship Paris, on Jan. 26th, returning after an absence of two years, during which time she had worked principally in the colonies of South Africa, organizing many new societies, conducting conventions and rendering invaluable aid to the white ribbon cause.

Archbishop Corrigan has written a letter approving the activity of the Catholic Total Abstinence Societies in New York city, which promise to take no mean part in opposing the Sunday opening of the saloons. Rev. Father Doyle, general secretary of the societies, says: "I have no faith whatever in the promise of saloon-keepers to refrain from selling liquor Sunday forenoons."

Governor Bissell, of New Hampshire, in his inaugural address, testifies that "the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors, after many years of trial, has become the settled policy of the state. The existing law and all the means provided for its enforcement have stood the test of time and experience and are receiving each year a firmer public support. The law is found sufficient to suppress the unlawful sale of liquor wherever public sentiment lends adequate support to its enforcement."

The Norwegian parliament has this year appropriated 12,000 kroner to aid the temperance societies in the work. Says Rev. C. F. Eltzholz in an account of the temperance movement there: "I am pleased to know that it is the intention of our Norwegian temperance friends, who are sick and tired of the Gothenburg system, to drive away the dispensaries and destroy the whole liquor traffic. If a country that has tried the best known system for the regulation of this unclean traffic is so dissatisfied with the experiment that it has adopted laws that provide for its discontinuance, other nations ought to take warning. It is not statesmanship to adopt a system that has proven itself to be a failure."

Since the days of William Tell, and before, the Swiss have been distinguished in archery. Prof. Hein, of Zurich, says with reference to the archery competitions: "I had occasion, a short time ago, to speak with one of those far-famed hunters. This clever marksman assures me that all who attain skill in shooting are strictly temperate men or abstainers. Even temperate men have to become abstainers about a week before entering into a schutzenfest (competition). The best marksmen not only abstain from alcohol, but live exclusively on milk, butter, cheese, and eggs. They must also go to bed betimes at night, and many of them do not smoke tobacco. Heavy smokers are never first-class marksmen."

THAT STARVATION STORY.

Mrs. Crouch Writes from Camas and Says Mr. Dice Still Lives.

CAMAS VALLEY, Or., May 15, 1895.

ED. HERALD: I shall answer the falsehood that came out in the Coquille Herald this week in regards to Johnson Dice being found dead in Eden valley. That is untrue, and the person that put that in the paper put in a falsehood, and they had better correct it as soon as possible. Mr. Dice is with us now, and is intending to go to Eden again this summer. He is an old man and has lived in the mountains all his life, or for 30 years, and doesn't like to live in the valley. He hasn't any home, and we, for accommodation to the old man, took him to Eden. It doesn't look like he would want to go back again if he were so badly uncared for. He was at Eden last December, and had been there all summer, but the snow came sooner than it usually does, and our cattle and the old man were snowed in so that my husband could not get there. He and Mr. Boren almost lost their lives trying to get there. We knew that Mr. Dice had plenty of potatoes to last him, and flour enough; he had killed a fat calf and was living better than those that were making so much fuss about it. It was our cattle that was starving instead of Mr. Dice.

If there is any reply to make to this, just go ahead with it. I should not have answered the piece, for it is only laughed at here in the valley, but at other places people do not know.

If anything further has transpired, as published in the Herald, we are not informed and have not been able to see any residents of Camas Valley who can confirm or deny the report. Jesse Belien just came in from there, and had heard nothing of the matter.

There seems to be a wide difference in the statement as first published in this paper and Mrs. Crouch's letter—the first that the man was very dead, and the latter that he was alive and presents with the writer. 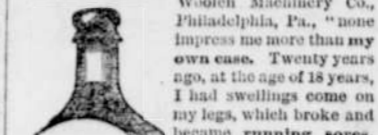
