Temperance Notes.

[From the National W. C. T. U. Bulletin.]

New Mexico legislature has passed a bill prohibiting the sale of tobacco to minors under eighteen years.

The Catholic Benevolent Legion, with 436 councils and 36,000 members, has voted to exclude ramblers.

As a result of the recent no-license election three-fourths of the state of Illinois is said to be under prohibition.

The fifth international congress against "the abuse of alcoholic drink" will be held at Basle, Switzerland, August 30-22.

Indiana W. C. T. U. is now in the midst of its spring schools of methods; the series this year comprises twenty-one schools.

It is reported that the magnificent gold dollar saloon in Buffalo, N. Y., is to be turned into a temperance saloon on the Chicago plan.

Madame Demorest and family have announced that they will continue the medal contest work of the late W. Jennings Demorest. The publication of "The Constitution," a monthly prohibition paper, will also be continued.

Judge Everett of the superior court, Lafayette, Ind., has decided in the woman suffrage test vote case brought by Mrs. Gougar, that under the state and national constitutions women are excluded from suffrage. The case will be appealed to the supreme court.

The first juvenile temperance society in the world to have a commencement is said to be the Effingham Band of Hope, of Illinois, which held commencement exercises beginning Friday, April 26, and closing with services in which the churches participated on Sunday morning and afternoon.

The "Western Christian Advocate" propounds the following problem: "If it costs \$1000 a year to carry on a church which saves five souls every year, and if a drink-shop license holder pays \$20 a year for the privilege of raising five souls, how long will it take a town having a population of 6000, with five churches and 15 drinkshops, to go to the devil?"

Earnest Words of W. Jennings Demorest.

The adjudication of moral questions is entirely dependent on the exercise of the people's conscience; so that when the conscience of the people is intelligent and prompt in its demands for recognition, when this conscience becomes dominant and unswerving in its claims for the just rights and privileges of the people, our chances for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are most secure and durable, and prosperity is sure to follow.

The concentrated elements of wrong-doing are all embodied in the license voter.

As no other authority is equal in effectiveness to a vote, the voter for a license party becomes personally responsible for all the tears of anguish, the desolated homes, and the accumulated horrors that the liquor traffic occasions.

Ever bear in mind that your vote is the best illustration of your manhood, your character, and your conscience.

License disseminates the seeds of criminal concession, and propagates its harvests of evil consequences. Prohibition uproots the vicious growth, destroys the seed, and makes virtue blossom everywhere.

The liquor traffic is the concentrated essence of crime and idleness.

To form is better than to reform. Government should prohibit all agencies which deform; then there would be no need to create agencies to reform.

The golden rule and the decalogue have no place in license legislation.

What we want on this question, is less of the mere shell of churchmanship, and more of the real spirit of christianity—less pretense and more practice.

We do not anticipate that there will be any radical changes in the administration of pension affairs under the new regime.

S. soldiers, sailors, and their heirs, take steps to make application as early as they have not already done so, in order to secure the benefit of the early filing of their claims in case there should be any future pension legislation. Such legislation is seldom retroactive. Therefore it is of great importance that applications be filed in the department at the earliest possible date.
