Temperance Notes.

[From the National W. C. T. U. Bulletin.]

Under orders from Governor Evans, liquors brought into South Carolina in violation of the dispensary law have been seized, despite the temporary injunction of Judge Goff to restrain such seizure.

U. S. Supreme Court, Dec. 5, 1887: Nor can we ignore the fact, established by statistics accessible to every one, that the disorder, pauperism, and crime so prevalent in the country are in large measure directly traceable to this evil—the alcohol.

The Methodist Times states that "In one of his recent speeches at Birmingham, Lord Roseberry made the following solemn and memorable statement: 'I go so far as to say this, that if the state does not soon control the liquor traffic, the liquor traffic will soon control the state.'"

A new saloon was recently opened in Boston, and the proprietor boasts that his receipts from 2 p. m. to 11 p. m. the same day were \$2840. And yet there are some people who still insist that the times are hard, money scarce, and thousands of families in Boston suffering for lack of food and clothing.

Cal. Christian Advocate: The bishops of the English church are much exercised over the prospect of disestablishing the Welsh church. They say that if the bill now before the house of commons shall pass, it will reduce the church in Wales to penury, and they urge members of the house from Wales to oppose the bill. From this distance it seems clear that disestablishment in the whole empire cannot be long delayed. A large and growing party in England believe that church and state should be separate, as in America.

The bar-room makes drunkards. I wish I could say that the purpose of the club was to make men sober, but as I cannot do so with truth, I might as well confess, among other things, that the tendency of the modern club is to intensify the drink habit till it degenerates, particularly with young men, into the disease of inebriety. I know of scores of promising lives, and so does every clubman of experience, that have been wrecked by the opportunities for conviviality afforded by clubs. If the stewards of the leading clubs in any of our cities would confess to the number of members they know to be habitual drinkers, or rather habitual drunkards, the report would startle the uninitiated."

Drunkness is not all the evil that comes from the use of intoxicating drink. We would to God it was. Dr. Sanger of New York says, in his "History of Prostitution," that if a woman drinks she is lost; that not one in a hundred of the fallen women of that city follow their vocation without drink. And he further says, of "two thousand fallen women who were questioned in relation to the habits of their parents, it was found that 1452 had drinking or drunken fathers, and 1125 had drinking or drunken mothers." These statements seem to make it evident that drunkenness and the social evil spring from the same source, and that the best way to advance the cause of social purity is to do away with the custom of drinking intoxicating drinks.

The Government Works.

On the new light station that is to be built at the mouth of the Coquille river work is in progress. Messrs. Days & Jeffery, of this city, are the firm to whom the contract was awarded by the government. Recently a quantity of material was shipped down to Coquille on the little coasting steamer Bandorille, and other shipments are to follow. This station is to be a fourth-order light, and its establishment will be a valuable acquisition in the interest and protection of commerce. For the construction of this light station the sum of \$50,000 was appropriated by congress.

Operations on the Coos bay jetty have been suspended owing to lack of funds. Captain Symons recommended that the sum of \$600,000 be appropriated, but congress reduced it to less than \$100,000. As the available funds were getting rather low, it was deemed best to shut down the work after the contractor had furnished the rock. Work, however, is in progress at the mouth of the Coquille river and at the mouth of the Siuslaw.

At Tillamook bay the work of improvement is in progress. This consists of dikebuilding with stone and brush.

Isaac Parr, who was accused of assisting his brother to escape from the Pendleton jail, was discharged by Justice Parker.

The mail service of Wells, Fargo & Co., one of the oldest established institutions of the coast, was abolished on the 27th. At one time 12,000 letters were handled daily by this service. The falling off in its business is ascribed to the improved service of the federal mail department.

On May 23d, the Michigan house of representatives passed by a vote of 57 to 17, and gave immediate effect to the Waine anti-treating bill. It prohibits the purchase in that state of spirits, malt, brewed, fermented or vinous liquor for another by a person to be given to another as a treat.

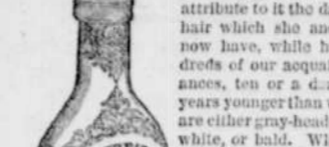
