The Woman's Infant Cloakmakers' Union of New York has reported to the Central Labor Federation that wages have been reduced in their trade 60 per cent, and that men are now doing the work of women for wages far below those earned by women. The change is the result of the introduction of the sweating system into this industry. No one need imagine that the price of baby cloaks will be any cheaper, however. The profit will simply go where it does not belong—to the middleman, who earns nothing.

Oregon's Best Waterways.

The enforced detention of four schooners in Siuslaw bay, through being caught by a shoaling bar while loading lumber, has led to a question of how many harbors on this coast might produce the same conditions. Capt. Symons states:

"There are two other bars from which this sudden shoaling trouble might be expected; these are at Nehalem and Alsea. The bars of other harbors along the coast have been so improved as to make it impossible for vessels once entering to be unable to get to sea. For a long time there was trouble with the Coos bay and Coquille river bars, but the effect of the government improvements have been such as to deepen the channels sufficiently to allow of the passage of deep water vessels. As a fact, a few people do not realize what the government has done in the shape of appropriations and harbor improvements on this coast; much of the work being so distant as to excite little or no comment except from the immediate residents of the locality."
