What a Farmer's Paper Says.
 The following article from the Farmers' Home Journal, published in San Francisco, is to the point. It is excellent advice to the people of Douglas county:
 Umpqua Valley, Oregon, like California, is suffering from railroad oppression, and the people feel it very keenly indeed. Some three or four years ago a movement was started to throw off this yoke by building an opposition road from Roseburg, the metropolis of the valley, out to Coos bay by the way of Myrtle Point and Coquille City, a distance of about ninety miles. From this point there is good water connection to either San Francisco or Portland. Work was begun from the Marshfield end of the line and the road was completed as far as Myrtle Point, situated above tide water on the Coquille river. Here the work stopped short, with a distance of sixty miles to cover before freedom could be realized. With the Coos Bay and Roseburg railroad completed, the people in the valley would be in an excellent position to dictate their terms, not only to the new road, but to the S. P. Co's lines as well. With an outlet through Coos bay, Roseburg would become a city of considerable importance, and the adjacent country would reap the full benefit as freights, through competition, would be placed at the lowest possible notch from Portland and San Francisco alike. For the sake of the valley, and for the sake of your home, why not push this undertaking forward? Push it to a speedy completion, and be free from high and discriminating freight rates.

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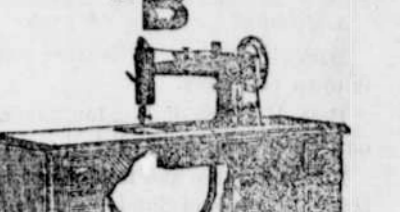

He is an old soldier, and we believe that soldiers and their heirs will receive justice at his hands. We do not anticipate that there will be any radical changes in the administration of pension affairs under the new regime.

We would advise, however, that U. S. soldiers, sailors, and their heirs, take steps to make application at once, if they have not already done so, in order to secure the benefit of the early filing of their claims in case there should be any further pension legislation. Such legislation is seldom retroactive. Therefore it is of great importance that applications be filed in the department at the earliest possible date. If U. S. soldiers, sailors or their widows, children or parents, desire information in regard to pension matters, they should write to THE PRESS CLAIMS COMPANY, at Washington, D.
