HOW HONEST MONEY "SWUNK" Creditors Get Neither 50-Cent Dollars Nor Fiat Money.

New York, N. Y., June 23.—The creditors of the defunct firm of Coffin & Stanton, bankers and brokers, to the extent of more than \$4,000,000 will not get a cent, according to the testimony of New-York man Erb, who recently resigned as receiver.

Erb was relieved of the receivership by Judge Lacomb of the U. S. court several days ago and Thomas P. Wicker was appointed in his place.

Erb was ordered to file his accounts and give testimony before Arthur H. Maston, standing master of the U. S. court. A portion of his accounts have been filed and the testimony is now being taken.

The estate of Coffin Stanton included \$3,923,259 collateral bonds, more than 75 per cent of which defaulted. These bonds were ex-clusive of \$5,000,000 stock in the defaulted company.

Peter Beeler, formerly one of the wealthiest citizens of Umattilla county, became intoxicated recently in company with a hobo. AND THIS DOWN IN TEXAS. Austin, Tex., July 2.—The state controller today gave the Corbett-Fitzsimmons fight a setback. In a letter to a tax-collector at Dallas, he says:

"While the act of 1889 provides for a tax of \$500 for a contest between man and man, the legislature has subsequently made it unlawful for any person to voluntarily engage in a pugilistic encounter for money, and upon the result of which any money is wagered, or to which any admission fee is charged. Honorably discharged soldiers and sailors who served ninety days, or over, in the late war are entitled, if now partially or wholly disabled for ordinary manual labor, whether disability was caused by service or not, and regardless of their pecuniary circumstances.

WIDOWS of such soldiers and sailors are entitled (if not remarried) whether soldier's death was due to army service or not, if now dependent upon their own labor for support. Widows not dependent upon their own labor are entitled if the soldier's death was due to service.

CHILDREN are entitled (if under 16 years) in almost all cases where there was no widow, or she has since died or remarried. PARENTS are entitled if soldier left neither widow nor child, provided soldier died in service, or from effects of service, and they are now dependent upon their own labor for support.

It makes no difference whether soldier served or died in late war or in regular army or navy. Soldiers of the late war, pensioned under one law, may apply for higher rates under other laws, without losing any rights.

Thousands of soldiers drawing from \$2 to \$10 per month under the old law are entitled to higher rates under new law, not only on account of disabilities for which now pensioned, but also for others, whether due to service or not.

Soldiers and sailors disabled in line of duty in regular army or navy since the war are also entitled, whether discharged for disability or not. Survivors, and their widows, of the Black Hawk, Creek, Cherokee, and Seminole or Florida Indian wars of 1832 to 1845, are entitled under a recent act.

MEXICAN WAR SOLDIERS and their widows also entitled, if 62 years of age or disabled or dependent. Old claims completed and settlement obtained, whether pension has been granted under later laws or not.
