Daily Plaindealer: Dr. Easter,

is truly one of the most remarkable  
of wrecks, inasmuch as the rear end  
of the train was dragged about two  
miles after becoming derailed, be-  
fore the final overturning of the  
caboose with four passengers on  
board. Not one of the passengers  
nor the conductor was very seri-  
ously hurt, though the car was  
turned over and demolished. After  
turning over the caboose was  
dragged along knocking down  
three telegraph poles and scatter-  
ing several hundred ties piled  
along the track.

### An Act of Heroism.

A brave act, worthy of notice,  
has been passed by us till the pre-  
sent because we had not realized

triumphed grandly.

A TRAIN HELD UP.

About 84000 Secured—Two Sus-  
pects Now Under Arrest.

Roseburg, Or., July 2.—About  
10:15 last (Monday) night as the  
north bound overland train came  
out of the mouth of Cow creek  
canyon between Glendale and Rid-  
dles, an explosion of dynamite  
blew the guards off the pony tracks  
and partly wrecked the engine,  
bringing the train to a sudden  
stop.

It was then attacked by three  
masked robbers, who forced the  
fireman and engineer to accompany  
them through the mail and express  
cars, where they registered mail,  
then through the passenger coaches,  
but did not secure much booty.  
Nobody was hurt, though one of  
the robbers took a shot at the con-  
ductor. The train was delayed  
nearly three hours.

John Case, alias McDowell, and  
James Pool were arrested on the  
5th and taken to jail at Roseburg.  
Case has been identified and both  
are believed to be the right parties.

BRANCH ASYLUM PUNCHED.

Judge Hewitt Declares the Law  
Locating it in Eastern Oregon  
Vind.

Judge Hewitt Tuesday, in Salem,  
rendered his decision in the case  
of the Eastern Oregon branch  
asylum. It is adverse to the act  
of the legislature, and, therefore,  
declares it unconstitutional and  
places a permanent injunction on  
the erection of the building. This  
case was tried before Judge Hewitt  
on the 29th of April on the ques-  
tion of fret as to the injury that  
would be sustained by the plaintiff,  
A. C. Taylor, should the asylum  
be built in Eastern Oregon as con-  
templated by the act of the last  
legislature, as under the decision  
of the supreme court when the  
case was appealed to it last year  
the question of constitutionality  
of erecting it away from the capital  
could not be raised unless the plain-  
tiff sustained some pecuniary in-  
jury thereby.

The court ruled that the branch  
insane asylum is one of the public  
institutions of the state of Oregon,  
and, by the constitution of the  
state of Oregon, required to be  
located at the seat of government.

That the acts of the legislative  
assembly of the state of Oregon  
above referred to are each in viola-  
tion of section 3, article 14, of the  
constitution of the state of Oregon,  
and void.

That the plaintiff is entitled to a  
decreed perpetually enjoining the  
defendants as such board or other-  
wise from using or expending the  
moneys of the state of Oregon in  
the purchase of lands for said  
branch insane asylum, and in the  
construction and maintenance  
thereof, or for any of the purposes  
of said acts of the legislative  
assembly of the state of Oregon.

\$33,000,000 during the last year.

went to the kitchen where his wife  
was preparing a meal, kissed her  
and then shot her through the  
body. He then shot himself.

REWARD WITHDRAWN.  
Hannibal, Mo., July 5.—R. Stil-  
well has withdrawn the reward of  
\$10,000 offered by him for the  
murderer or murderers of his father.  
His action has created a sensation  
and revived the story of the hor-  
rible tragedy that was enacted on  
the night of December 31, 1887,  
when the wealthy pork packer was  
killed in his own home.

A JUDGE CHARGED WITH MALFEAS-  
ANCE.  
Portland, July 2.—B. M. Smith,  
judge of the municipal court, was  
arrested at 1:15 this afternoon on a  
warrant issued out of Judge Ste-  
phens' court, upon an indictment  
returned by the grand jury, charging  
him with malfeasance and  
negligence in office. The indict-  
ment was returned at noon today  
and the warrant of arrest was  
served by Chief Deputy Sheriff  
Emanuel Myer.

Judge Smith's bonds were fixed  
at \$1000, and he immediately  
made arrangements to furnish the  
required amount.

The indictment returned against  
the municipal judge today is the  
outcome of an investigation into  
the conduct of the affairs of his  
office, set on foot several weeks ago.

The indictment states at great  
length that he is guilty of the  
abuse of the trust and that he  
failed to perform his duties as re-  
quired by law. The alleged mal-  
feasance is claimed to have been  
committed in connection with the  
Mattie Wilson "straw" bond case.

age, escaped from the reform  
school at Salem last week.
