Temperance Notes.

The services in Westminster Abbey on the Sunday evening following the World's W. C. T. U. convention were attended by a large number of white ribbon women, seats having been reserved by order of the dean for the leaders of the different nations. The Bishop of Dover preached a straightforward, earnest sermon, in which he advocated total abstinence and strong legal measures against the liquor traffic. He referred warmly to the great convocation of temperance women that had been holding meetings in London during the week, and which was represented in the historic old abbey at this temperance gathering. He said there were people who thought it witty to laugh at the temperance cause, but there was no cause more sacred. Dean Bradley read those conclusive verses of Paul, "If meat causes my brother to offend, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth." The anthem, "Cry aloud and spare not," sent a great wave of fresh young voices through the "dim mysterious aisles" of the venerable edifice, which we venture to say has never before witnessed a service wherein the organized undenominational work of women has been recognized.

The Connecticut legislature has adjourned after a six months' session during which a great number of reform bills were introduced, some passing the house but being lost in the senate. A measure providing for a secret ballot on the license question passed. The bill to raise the age of protection for girls from 14 to 18 years passed the house, but the senate refused to raise it higher than 16 years, and so it finally passed.

Miss Frances E. Willard's conduct of the assembly of the World's Woman's Temperance Union at the Queen's Hall, would, writes our London correspondent, have been a credit to the speaker of the house of commons. Her clear, ringing voice was to be heard to the furthest tier of the vast hall, and her grasp of the business of the meeting astonished even those who were familiar with exceptional ability.

The Anti-Saloon Army and the W. C. T. U. of Clinton, Missouri, have been asking business men of that city to pledge themselves not to sign saloon petitions or give bonds for saloon-keepers.

One of the greatest obstacles in the way of the temperance reform is the use of wine and brandy on the tables of the well-to-do. Drinking is a sin, not in degree, but in itself.
