Temperance Notes.

[From the National W. C. T. U. Bulletin.]
An American traveler in Normandy says that in a country tavern he found the following printed card on the wall detailing the law of that land against intoxication: "After two formal condemnations for scandalous and public drunkenness (mere committals do not count), the offender, ipso facto, incurs the following disabilities: (1) Loss of his vote, (2) may not be voted for, (3) may not serve on a jury, (4) may not exercise any administrative facilities, such as acting as executor of a will, and (5) loses the right to carry arms.

Albert Lieber, vice-president of the Indiana Brewers' Association, states that "Those who have been driven out of business by the operation of the Nicholson law, added to those who will be compelled to quit business September 1st, through inability to renew their license on account of the protest feature of the law, will aggregate 2500, or one-fourth of the whole number." The Liquor Dealers' Association has called a state convention to devise plans for protecting the trade from the "fanatical persecution" of the Good Citizens' League in enforcing the Nicholson temperance law.

The Toledo Blade gives the testimony of a druggist that calisaya drunkards are rapidly increasing in number. He says: "The unfortunate victims of the calisaya habit ignorantly think that in calisaya they have found a drink which has the stimulating effects of whisky without any of its physical penalties, when the fact that they are practically only adding the spur of quinine to their whisky, which is thinly disguised by calisaya. A man with a calisaya jag is sincerely to be pitied. He is just a little short of being a raving maniac. His ears ring like an anvil from the effects of the quinine, while his blood riots through his veins like a mill race at the bidding of the alcohol."

In two test cases under the Nicholson temperance law, Judge Taylor of Terre Haute, Indiana, has decided that the law is inoperative because of a defect in the penalty clause. The clause reads, "Upon conviction of the violation of this or other of the foregoing sections," instead of "Upon conviction for the violation of any of the provisions of this or either of the foregoing sections." Judge Taylor holds that as the law applies to the whole section, all of the provisions of sections referred to would have to be violated to make it operative in the cases passed upon. This decision does not apply to the constitutionality of the law. The decision is regarded by Eli F. Ritter and other leading lawyers as an absurdity and untenable.

Thomas Byrnes, superintendent of the New York police department, says: "After all, if we hunt vice and crime back to their lairs, we will be pretty sure to find them in the gin-mill. Drunkenness is the prolific mother of most of the evil-doing."

He could not guarantee anything. There were very few bids, and the Bawnmore was sold for \$170 cash to L. Foard, the ship chandler. The cargo went to A. Radgier for \$305. The Bawnmore was insured for \$100,000 and the cargo for \$75,000. Woodside & Co., of Belfast, Ireland, owned the vessel.

Capt. Dale, of Coaledo, made final proof, Saturday, on 80 acres of coal land in section 15, township 27 south, range 13 west, paying \$800 therefor.
Jno. Curran, one of the foremen at Beaver Hill, while assisting in lowering some horses down the slope, Wednesday evening, was kicked in the face, receiving an ugly wound.
It is said the saloon at Beaver Hill was burglarized Sunday night, and several hundred dollars stolen. The Recorder says that freight rates between the Coquille and San Francisco have fallen to \$2.50 per ton. We can remember the time when \$20 per ton was charged for taking wool from the Coquille to the city.
Shooting birds on the wing is an old and favorite pastime, but shooting salmon on the jump is a new departure. Ed Tower tried it Sunday morning, and succeeded in killing a fine silyerside, who was too frisky for his own good.
The drill used in boring for coal at Newport was down 947 feet on Monday. Some trouble was experienced lately in boring, owing to the rods becoming fast in the hole, but Mike McCormack and Pat Hennessy were equal to the emergency, and everything is in running order again.

The Southern Oregon company's camp at Sumner has been shut down.

A change was noticed in the sound of the Arcata's whistle last week, and upon inquiry it was found to be the whistle taken off of the wreck Bawnmore and was presented to Captain Cousins by the master of the ill-fated ship.
The steamer Alcazar went to sea Sunday, taking a cargo of lumber from the Southern Oregon company's mill at Empire City. We are informed, from a reliable source, that a steamer belonging to that company will run here regular, whether the Alcazar or not is not known.
A hog was received at E. G. Flanagan's slaughterhouse last week from the creamery, that dressed 580 pounds; two of the band together weighed over 900 pounds.
Dr. Tower removed a cancer from John Kelly, of Libby, last week. The cancer was located in the region of the back. Mr. Kelly stood the operation well and it is hoped he is on the high road to recovery.
C. D. McFarlin, of North Slough, was in Marshfield Tuesday. He reports an average cranberry crop this year and will begin picking one week from Monday.
Mr. Moody is reported to have said that when he wants \$100,000 for any Christian work, he expects to get \$80,000 of it from Presbyterians.
