SAM BROWN MUST HANG.

So the Supreme Court Decided. Sentence Must Be Passed Again in December.

Salem, Or., Oct. 14.—The supreme court today affirmed the decision of the lower court in the Brown murder case. This apparently defeats the last hope the defendant might have of escaping the gallows.

A Review reporter carried the telegram containing news of the decision to the prisoner in the jail. "I have rather bad news for you, Sam," said the reporter extending the dispatch to him. Brown seized the paper eagerly but his face showed not the slightest emotion as he read it, and he spoke very calmly:

"It is not very pleasant news, but I am glad it is settled!" was all he said, besides thanking the reporter for bringing the dispatch.

(Sam Brown shot and killed Alfred Kincaid at Oakland, Oregon, Aug. 13th, 1894. He was tried at the December term of court of last year and convicted of murder in the first degree. Judge Fullerton sentenced him to hang February 15th, last. Execution of the sentence was suspended pending an appeal to the supreme court, and today the decision was affirmed. He will have to be re-sentenced at the next term of court, which will convene in December. Brown walked out of the jail on the 21st of May last, the jailer having left the doors unlocked. After wandering around a couple of days, he came to the house of John R. Sutherland near Wilbur, and that gentleman brought him back to jail without any difficulty.)—Roseburg Review.
