POPULIST COUNTY CONVENTION.

The People's Party county convention of Coos county, Oregon, will be held at Coquille City, on Thursday, March 19, 1896, beginning at 11 o'clock a. m.

Primaries for the purpose of electing delegates to said convention will be held in each precinct of said county on Thursday, March 12, 1896, from 10 o'clock a. m. to 4 o'clock p. m.

Table listing precincts and delegates: Bandon, 2 Myrtle Point, 2; Burton Prairie, 1 South Marshfield, 2; Coquille City, 2 North Marshfield, 2; Coaledo, 1 Newport, 2; Coos City, 1 North Coos River, 2; Coos River, 2 Norway, 2; Deer Park, 1 Parkersburg, 2; Dora, 1 Randolph, 2; Empire City, 1 Riverton, 2; Enchanted, 1 Rowland, 2; Fourmile, 1 South Slough, 1; Lake, 1 Summit, 1; Mission, 2 Tenmile, 1.

Being one delegate at large for each precinct and one delegate for each 100 votes or major fraction thereof cast in June 1894 for governor.

Blank ballots will be sent to each precinct for the primary election, and the initiative method will be used at all officers to be nominated. Each precinct will canvass its own ballots and send the results only to the county convention by the delegate.

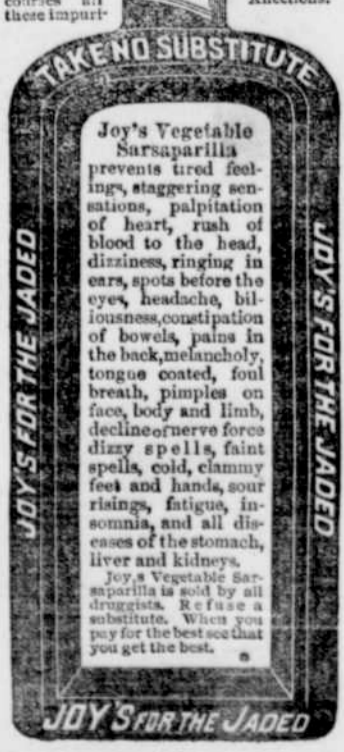
