THE COUNTY SEAT QUESTION

In the very near future the voters
will have thrust upon them the
responsibility of deciding by their
ballots the permanent location of
the seat of government of this
county. A mistake made in this
matter will be a permanent mistake.

It has now become necessary, there-
fore, for the entire voting popula-
tion of the county, no matter where
they may live, or what their personal
interests are, to begin to consider
this vital question in the light of
the present and future best interests
of the entire population of the
county. We have reached a point
now where personal interests and
selfish ambitions must be laid aside,

and the good of the county must be
paramount in deciding how we ought
to vote. No doubt, from a selfish view-
point, the people of Marshfield
would be pleased to have the county
seat located there. The same, of
course, is true of Myrtle Point and
of Bandon. But the point to be
considered now is not whether this
or that town would be benefited
most by locating the county seat in
the town, but the question to be
taken into account by the honest
and intelligent voter is, where ought
the county seat be located so as to
equitably divide the distance of
travel and the expense to the citi-
zens of the various sections of the
county in visiting the seat of gov-
ernment for the transaction of busi-
ness?

If, in considering these two ques-
tions, Coquille City should be left
out by an honest vote, we of this
town ought to be fair and honest
enough to say amen to it. But if,
on the other hand, it shall become
apparent that Coquille City is the
most central and the easiest of
access for the majority of our peo-
ple who will be compelled to trans-
act business with the county offi-
cials, then, regardless of personal
interests and preferences, the honest
voter will feel himself under obli-
gation to vote for Coquille. That
this is the most central town in the
county will not be denied by any
fair-minded person. If anyone will
take the trouble to look at a map
of Coos county they will see at a
glance that Coquille City is by far
the nearest town to the geographi-
cal center of the county. Then
when we consider the center of popu-
lation Coquille is unquestionably
the nearest to it. Added to the
above is the fact that Coquille City
is the exact center of all transpor-
tation lines and routes of travel.

It is, therefore, the most accessible
as well as the most central town in
the county. The south half of the
county being the largest agricul-
tural district will of necessity out-
grow all other parts in population.
In fact, everything favors Coquille
as the future county seat of Coos
county.

Blown Up With Powder.

An explosion of a can of powder
at the blacksmith shop at McCann's
sawmill, about 4 miles below Ban-
don, Thursday last week, was
quite serious though not fatal in
any instance. While the shop
itself was blown into smithereens,
the only personal sufferer was our
former townsman, Todd Dickson,
brother of E. E. Dickson of this
place. Todd was the blacksmith
and machinist at the sawmill and
was operating in his shop at the
time of the explosion, which, while
unaccountable, is still inexcusable
for the storage of the dangerous
stuff at such a place. We have
not heard how it ignited, but the
result was that Mr. Dickson was
blown a considerable distance,
badly hurt and very badly burned
about his face and body, whose
escape with his life is miraculous.
The building was a complete
wreck, and the tools and machinery
were scattered promiscuously.
Mr. Dickson's clothing was found
to be on fire, but extinguished at
the earliest possible moment. His
bruises and burns will keep him in
his room for some time, although
we learned yesterday that he was
doing well.
