Death of Rev. Wm. Wells. Rev. Wm. M. Wells, the Baptist minister recently sent to this station by the state board of that denomination, died in this city Thursday morning of last week—March 19th—after a comparatively brief illness. Mr. W. had been to Roseburg on business, and returned to Coquille over the mountain road during the snow storm and bad weather in the latter part of February, from which he was completely exhausted and contracted inflammation of the lungs and was threatened with pneumonia. He kept on his feet much of the time till three or four days before his death, when he suddenly expired. Wm. M. Wells was born in Wirt county, Virginia, July 2, 1836. He had been a minister many years, about ten of which have been in Oregon. He was married to Miss Florence McAboy in Meigs county, Ohio, in 1866, who survives him and is temporarily residing here. Two daughters also survive him—Mrs. C. E. Lester at Vancouver, B. C., and Miss Minnie Wells, now with her mother in this city, visiting from San Francisco, Cal.

The burial took place Friday afternoon last at our Masonic cemetery, attended by a large concourse of citizens. Mr. W. had made a large circle of friends in the short while he had resided here, and was a faithful servant of the church.

Milton E. Babb, a San Francisco attorney who owns a fine ranch above Myrtle Point, brought up a number of horses on the last trip of the Homer and took them up to the ranch last Monday. Mr. Babb is a subscriber to the HERALD.

Judge Schroeder came to this place last Thursday and held an inquiring in the case of Robert Burns, of Marshfield arrested and held here on the charge of insanity. Burns was adjudged insane and given into the custody of Sheriff Gage, who departed with him for the asylum at Salem by Friday's train. "Bob" seemed to be growing worse, and showed a disposition for violence toward the last. He had many acquaintances here, as he had worked on the railroad at this point, and been several times a chain carrier for the county surveyor while laying out new roads and at other service.

The schooner Mattie T. Dyer went ashore on "French Frigate" shoal near Honolulu, February 22d, and became a total loss. She was on her way to the Japan sea. The entire crew of twenty-three men was saved, and they are now on their way to San Francisco on the United States steamer Bennington. The men lost everything, but thought themselves lucky to escape with their lives. The Dyer was owned in San Francisco, and was one of the most successful of the fleet for several seasons past. She was built on the Coquille, and had been pronounced the handsomest and fastest sealer that ever went from San Francisco. She was worth \$15,000, and was insured for only \$9000. "Teachers currents" and not a storm drove the vessel to wreck.
