

POPULIST COUNTY CONVENTION.

Official Proceedings—Platform and Nominations—Everything in Love and "The King" Knocked Out.

The Coos county Populist convention convened at Coquille City March 19, 1896, at 1 o'clock, with J. S. McEwen as temporary chairman and B. F. Savage temporary secretary.

On motion, the chair appointed W. H. Nosler, J. Ernst and I. T. Weekly a committee on credentials. Convention adjourned until report of committee on credentials was made.

On reconvening of the convention the report of committee on credentials was read and adopted as follows:

W. H. Nosler was then chosen permanent chairman and B. F. Savage and W. Phillips permanent secretaries.

Motion made and carried that the chair appoint a committee of five on resolutions. The following were appointed: J. A. Doak, Parkersburg; A. C. Wilson, Libby; T. A. Walker, Coquille; Ed Davis, Tenmile; W. F. Volkmar, Rowland Prairie.

On motion, the chair appointed five delegates to count the returns of the primaries, as follows: A. Osborn, Joel Patterson, M. I. Swift, E. E. Hayes and O. A. Kelly.

On motion, adjournment was had to count the votes and allow the committee to prepare resolutions. On reconvening of convention the following resolutions were submitted and adopted:

1. We demand the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the ratio of 16 to 1, upon terms of exact equality, regardless of foreign nations.

2. We demand a national paper currency, safe and sound, issued by the general government only, a full legal tender for all debts, public and private, without the help of banking corporations; said currency backed by the faith of all the people and all the wealth of the government the same as national bonds.

3. We demand the amount of circulating medium be speedily increased to \$50 per capita, or more if necessary, to do the business of the country on a cash basis.

4. We are unalterably opposed to the issue of any more bonds by the United States in time of peace, and demand that the government use either gold or silver in payment of coin obligations, as provided by law.

5. We urge a state constitutional convention at the earliest possible date in order to amend our constitution so as to give the people direct legislation, through the Initiative and Referendum of the widest applicable form, giving the people a chance to propose and vote on all state and national questions.

6. We oppose the importation of pauper and contract labor from all countries and favor a more stringent law restricting the same.

7. We demand the re-enactment of the mortgage tax law in this state.

8. We demand that the state shall print and issue all school books to the people at cost.

9. We demand that the road supervisors be elected by the direct vote of the people in their respective road districts.

Resolved, 1. That the People's party of Coos county hereafter nominate candidates for the various offices by the Initiative and Referendum, said candidates to be recommended by five known Populists and published in one or more newspapers for at least two weeks before such convention.

Resolved, 2. That all questions pertaining to the good of the party shall be submitted to the people for a direct vote after being signed by 25 Populists and published in newspapers for at least two issues.

Resolved, 3. That delegates to state and national conventions be instructed not to fuse with any party that does not adhere to these principles.

T. Howard moved that we elect county officers for one term only. Motion made to amend same, that "provided the people sanction it at the primaries." Amendment carried, and motion as amended carried.

Motion made and carried that all candidates having a clear majority of all votes cast be declared the nominees of the convention.

The following persons were then declared the nominees for the following offices:

Coroner—Chas. Howe.

Motion made and carried that when no candidate had received a majority of all votes cast that the convention choose from the two having the largest vote.

Convention then balloted for county clerk, Frank A. Smith receiving 19 votes and J. J. Stanley 7. Mr. Smith was declared the nominee.

For county commissioner, I. T. Weekly received 23 votes and J. C. Laird 3 votes. Mr. Weekly was declared the nominee.

Motion made and carried that the office of surveyor be left vacant.

Motion made and carried that the nominees of this convention defray the expenses of a delegate to the state convention.

Convention adjourned until 7 p. m.

On reconvening of convention at 7:30, motion made that we submit the one term proposition at the next primaries. Motion lost.

Moved and carried that convention adjourn until voting precincts nominate justices and constables.

W. H. Nosler was recommended as joint representative for Coos and Curry counties.

Report of various precincts on nominations for justices of the peace and constables read and adopted.

Moved and carried that the manner of voting be left in the hands of central committee.

Moved and carried that we adjourn.
