County Seat Meeting at Bandon.

By invitation of some of the business men of Bandon, a delegation of citizens of Coquille, some twenty in number, visited that place last Friday, and attended a county seat meeting in the evening. A large gathering of Bandon's citizens was in attendance, and the meeting was a very pleasant affair indeed. J. M. Upton was chosen chairman and Geo. F. Topping secretary. J. S. McCain, of the Herald, was invited to present the subject to be considered, the removal of the county seat, which he did in a few introductory remarks. The discussion then became general and a large number of persons responded to calls to speak, among whom were A. J. Sherwood, J. H. Roberts, R. D. Sanford, J. M. Upton, Judge Nosler, Peter Loggie and various others. So far as the sentiment of the Bandon people could be ascertained from the speeches, it was almost universal in favor of locating the county seat on the Coquille river. The people of Bandon seem to understand that it will be removed by this vote, and that Coquille is the most available place.

There was an average enrollment of 110 pupils in our school the 1st month, and an average attendance of 103 for the month. The Populist club has set Wednesday evening of next week for its regular meeting, and on Wednesday evenings thereafter. All are invited to attend.

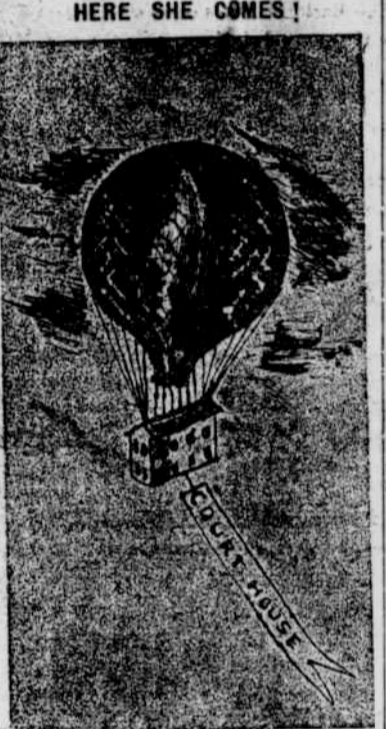
COAL—Any persons wishing to purchase coal from the Coquille coal mine will please leave orders at the HERALD office.
