A GUN OF THE ENEMY SPIKED.

The "Ring" Was in Marshfield and Not in Empire—The Swindling Advertising Conspirators Routed.

ED. HERALD: I do not begin this correspondence with the expectation of winning laurels, either literary or political, or of any other kind whatever; but I begin it with the intention of nailing some of the many lies and misstatements that have appeared in that filthy sheet, the Sun. I begin it with the full realization that I shall thereby bring down upon my head all the vile and base epithets and billingsgate of which the editor of that sheet is master (and they are legion). For this very reason I have long hesitated to open this correspondence, for I will remember the adage that "they who touch pitch will be defiled." I have also hesitated for the further and satisfying knowledge that the editor of that paper is too well known to wield any influence. But fearing that some person might be beguiled into accepting even a few of his many contortions as truth, I have decided to answer a few of them; and since so much of his spleen has been vented against me, personally, your readers will please excuse the frequent occurrence of the first person, singular, pronoun.

In the first place, when our kind, obliging and efficient county clerk, D. F. Dean, sent to the Sun a certified copy of the county court proceedings for the January term, 1895, of the said court, the editor of that paper printed it in such miserable form and with so many errors that the county court refused to pay him for it. He then claimed that it was the fault of the copy which the clerk had sent him. This the clerk denies and can fully substantiate his denial by witnesses, for he (the clerk) had been more careful than ever before, if possible, to have the copy correct, and carefully compared his copy with his records before sending it to the paper. The extra precaution taken by the clerk in this instance was taken because the clerk anticipated just such a dispute on account of former blunders made by the said paper in its publication of the said court proceedings of former terms; and the county court had cautioned the clerk to always take extra precaution to have his copies so sent correct. So the clerk was fully fortified against any attempt to shift blame upon him. The county court finally ordered (see Journal number five, page 520, county court proceedings) as follows: "This court demands of said J. A. Luse to exhibit said certified copy to this court, that the court may compare said copy with the proceedings as published; that the claim for publishing the schedule of expenditures of the January, 1895, term of this court be continued until the said J. A. Luse exhibits the said certified schedule furnished him by the clerk." The said J. A. Luse has not produced the said certified schedule nor does he dare do so. He then began his tirade against the county courthouse ring.

Now a word about that courthouse ring: As I have been so frequently accused of being at the head of, or a prominent member of this ring, I will state here that if he says that any ring, any combination or any understanding whatever exists among or between any of the present county officials for the sole purpose of obtaining an office for themselves, as he has intimated, or for any one of them in which we would assist any friend and Populist who had been nominated by the people to be elected, he simply lies. There is no such thing as a "courthouse ring" that any of the said officials know anything about, and every one of us stand ready to make affidavit to this statement at any time.

Next, when Sheriff Gage discovered that there was a combination formed by the newspapers published on the bay for the express purpose of charging exorbitant prices for publishing legal notices, and the Sun, with the rest of them, would charge double or treble the amount charged by the HERALD for such work, he thought it only fair to litigants, and it was his strict duty as an officer to have the work done where it would cost the least, and he sent his notices to the HERALD. Of course this at once brought down upon his head the fearful indignation of that great and worthy reformer, the editor of the Sun. If any of your readers will call on me at any time at Empire, I will show them notices published by the Sun on which the charges were \$20 and \$25, and notices of the same length published by the HERALD for which the charges were from \$5 to \$10, and will show the receipts for the amount paid on them.

Another cause of the malice of the said J. A. Luse is that in the organization of the Sun Printing Co. a large number of Populists sought to organize a corporation, own and control a wide-awake Populist newspaper and place at the head of it a man of parity and integrity and one who would win and keep the respect of all of his readers. But the said J. A. Luse "got in his work," and as we were

not accustomed to fighting the devil with his own weapons, the said Luse defeated us, elected himself and others of his ilk directors of the corporation, compelled all other stockholders except themselves to pay up their stock in full, made a fraudulent sale of his property to E. G. Flanagan, purchased the same (or attempted to do so) from E. G. Flanagan for the corporation, appointed himself editor and manager-in-chief and continued to run things in such a high-handed manner that our only recourse was a suit in equity and petition for appointment of a receiver to take charge of the property during the pendency of the suit. In this we hoped to regain our rights, but were soon undeceived. On a motion of the defendants for dismissal of the receiver, which motion was heard in chambers at Roseburg last September, that Roseburg(?) attorney Hamilton (so we are informed by Gen. Siglin, who was there) argued to our most learned and incorruptible circuit judge that the Populists were in the ascendancy in Coos county; that if Mr. Vanderburg continued to control the Sun they would all work in harmony and continue to be in the ascendancy; but that whereas if the said Vanderburg were dismissed and J. A. Luse reinstated, that he would create such a row among the Populists as would most likely result in their defeat in 1896; that these fool Populists had gone about far enough anyway and it was about time a quietus was being put on them.

The receiver was dismissed and we, the bona fide stockholders, are "in the soup." I will send you next week certified copies of the most striking parts of the testimony taken in this suit before the referee, which contain some wonderful statements made by the said J. A. Luse on his oath.

Again, if he says that neither Sheriff Gage nor Clerk Dean are competent to run their respective offices he simply lies, as the public well knows.

Again, if he charges Sheriff Gage with having two bailiffs appointed for the one jury he lies. That was some more work done by our most beloved and economical circuit judge. For the two bailiffs were ordered by the judge, and Mr. Gage had never thought of such a thing.

Again, if he says that more deputies have been employed by Mr. Gage or Mr. Dean at any time during the term of office of either of them than were actually necessary he simply lies. He might be able to make a few persons who are not posted believe a portion of his rantings about these deputies. But the facts are these: under the fee system the clerk and sheriff each employed and paid their own deputies and no one ever knew how much they did pay for deputy hire. Some few might be led to believe that they never had any deputies. But for more than two thirds of the time I was county clerk I had two persons besides myself in the office; and many times I had three or four; and yet I never kept any idlers about.

Again, as to Albrecht's escape, your readers have all read the statement of the nurse which exonerates Sheriff Gage entirely, except, of course, as to any damages which might be sustained by any one from the escape. But Mr. Gage has good and sufficient bondsmen; if anybody is injured, let them apply to the courts for relief. The nurse stated that he directly disobeyed the instructions given him by Mr. Gage; otherwise the escape would have been impossible.

Again, as to that Chinese wash bill, Mr. Gage had the Chinese laundry do the washing for the jail because one of the prisoners confined therein had an unmentionable disease, or was supposed to have had; and he would not give the washing to a white person under such circumstances. If he says that the Chinamen do my washing he simply lies. During my four years' residence in Empire Chinamen have done my washing about four times, and then when it was simply impossible to get any one else to do it, within the time it was needed. When my wife is well she does our washing. When she is not able we send it to the Coos Bay Steam Laundry or employ white women to come to the house and do it.

If he says that Mr. Gage spent time on his ranch that was needed in his office, he simply lies. When the Sun's Empire reporter said that Mr. Gage was on his ranch, he was in Myrtle Point attending to his official duties as sheriff.

Again, if he says that the county has been out a single cent for the recapture of escaped prisoners since the steel cages have been in use he simply lies.

J. A. Luse is not a Populist and never has been and never could be. The stuff of which true Populists are made does not exist in his anatomy, not in the smallest fractional quantity, and fully nine-tenths of the Populists of this county would be only too glad to kick him out of the ranks altogether and obliterate the stain he has made in the ranks. This statement is substantiated by the manner in which he was sat down upon

As to that one term resolution: it is not and never was a Populist measure, and the crushing vote with which it was repealed by the voters of the party proves it. This resolution was only a subterfuge by which he managed in 1894 to knock out those who would not obey his dictations. But the people are awake to his trickery and have politely but very decidedly sat down upon him.

Of course the — Mail and the Coos Bay News try to sanctify everything published in the Sun, but sometimes the stench is greater than even the — Mail can bear, which is, indeed, an almost incomprehensible state of affairs.

As to that unmentionable, filthy, rotten old sot who writes under the name of "Snowball" (what a slander and an insult to the name!) we do not consider his demoniacal ravings worth the answering.

If I have not made the "dark and secret ways" of this thing plain, I shall be glad to answer through your columns any questions in the matter.

"Failed to Come to Time."

The Sun's correspondent at Empire said, in the issue of that paper of the 7th inst.: "I will send you next week the statement of several responsible parties on the jail break. In the same article he called the attention of the grand jury 'to the cheap literature, cartoons, etc., that is posted upon the courthouse walls.'" We kept our weather-eye on Reporter's "Jottings," but he falsified in this case as he had done in former reportorial duties. He made no statement of the "jail break," as he calls it, nor made any notice of the fact that the grand jury had already inquired into his frothings against the sheriff, examined all who knew anything about the affair attached, and found that no blame attached to any officer in any manner. They did find that an aged, decrepit and thoughtless watchman, appointed by the sheriff because he was old, poor, without work and had a family dependent upon him, and in violation of the positive orders of the sheriff, permitted an old, weak and half-dead prisoner to slip out of the jail enclosure and go a short distance from the prison. The watchman was immediately discharged, and justifies the act of the sheriff and exonerates him of any blame.

As for the "cartoons, etc.," that have been posted, when Judge Fullerton was asked by one of the grand-jurymen if anything could or should be done about it, that gentleman wittily replied that but one side of the walls had been used, intimating that the other fellows might use the other.

Rev. Homer M. Street, the new pastor of the Christian church in Coquille, accompanied by his family arrived in this city last Saturday, and held his first service Sunday evening. The HERALD extends to Mr. Street and family a cordial welcome.
