Bandon's Budget. Bandon, June 6th.—That wedding will come off next week. The election here Monday passed off nicely. Two hundred and forty-five votes were cast. Coquille received 175 votes at this place Monday for the county seat.

A. D. Morse was elected justice of the peace and S. N. B. Hunt constable for Dist. No. 6—both Populists. The Populists of this precinct gained 35 votes over their vote two years ago. How is that for Bandon? Stutz's Theatre left this place Thursday morning. They went to Marshfield and from there they will leave the county.

Steve Gallier now has charge of the Bandon Hotel. The change was made this week, Mr. Thomas retiring. A goodly number of our townspeople are getting out matchwood these good times that we were looking for. But did not the Pops tell you there were hard times ahead?

J. H. Roberts has leased the Thomas wharf and washhouse and will run the same for the best interests of the people. 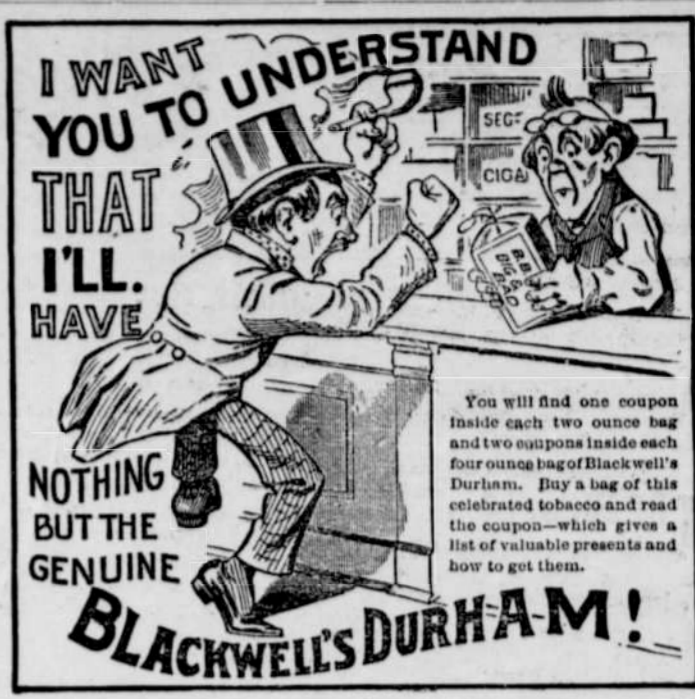

The murderer made good his escape on horseback, and though scores of people have been on his track, he has succeeded in eluding them up to the present. NEWS NOTES. BUFFALO, N. Y., June 1.—Grain Shovelers Union, No. 15, struck for an advance of wages from \$1.80 per thousand bushels to \$2.50. They also declare for no Sunday work, for privilege of employing overtime-keepers who are to be at the elevators and not at the saloons as heretofore.

HOME CAPITAL, INSTEAD OF BRITISH. Omaha, June 3.—The Yankton & Norfolk railway, construction of which was suspended about two years ago, when its British proprietor decamped, has been taken up by Omaha men with a prospect that the line will shortly be completed and operated. Articles of incorporation have been filed. The road will traverse the counties of Cedar, Knox, Pierce and Madison.

ST. LOUIS, June 1.—A mass meeting has been called for Tuesday afternoon, to consider the advisability of appealing for outside aid for the relief of storm sufferers.
