What about voting for free silver as well as talking for it? Wouldn't it be consistent, to say the least?

A letter from a friend living in Herrington, Wash., tells us that there are but three goldbugs and supporters of McKinley in that place.

Who is Hanna that you have to vote for him, or as he dictates? When did he serve this country that he merits the support of the people?

Ex-Judge E. B. Watson of Portland, a brother of our Judge D. L. Watson of Marshfield, and always a staunch and influential Republican, is supporting the free silver cause and will vote for Bryan.

Welcome, patriots! Hon. J. B. Montgomery, Judge E. B. Watson, ex-supreme judge of Oregon, and Hon. J. A. Wright, of Union county, are the latest prominent Republicans of Oregon to declare for Bryan.

In this campaign the free men of all parties will unite for Bryan and bimetalism to resist organized wealth and the great gold trust that is just as surely enslaving the debt-classes and poorer people of our country.

Polk and Yamhill will roll up good majorities for Bryan and bimetalism. It is a union campaign, as in the days of 1860, when all the loyal elements of the north united to elect Abraham Lincoln and save the union.

The Morris Bros ranch and mill, above this place, were sold at receiver's sale at Empire City on the 15th ult. to the Pacific Marine & Supply Co. of San Francisco, for \$5982.77, the amount of their claim. This was the only bid made.

Abraham Lincoln: "If a government contracted a debt with a certain amount of money in circulation, and then contracted the money volume before the debt was paid, it is the most heinous crime that a government could commit against the people."

Daniel Webster: "I am certainly of the opinion that gold and silver at rates fixed by congress constitute the legal tender standard of this country, and that neither congress nor any state has authority to establish any other standard or displace this standard."

Eugene Guard: Hon. Plinn Cooper, of Roseburg, and a Republican member of the legislature four years ago, has declared himself in a public letter for Bryan. Gone to join such honorable gentlemen as Hons. C. H. Baker, D. C. Baughman and M. J. Hillegas, of Lane county.

We greet our old friend, Hon. Plinn Cooper, of Roseburg. We knew he was a patriot and would do what he believed to be right. He is one of the yeomanry of the state, and they are always to be depended on for the country's welfare, in peace or war. He announces his intention to vote for Bryan, free silver and prosperity.

The Coos Bay News has been very consistent in its support of the main doctrine of its party in this campaign—the free coinage of silver—but where does it stand on the legislative ticket? Is it in favor of Mr. Buckman, a free silver and financial reform candidate, or Mr. Bennett, a goldbug and defender of national banks?

THAT BISMARCK LETTER.

At a large and enthusiastic Bryan meeting held at Mt. Angel, in Marion county, on the 5th inst., Hon. E. Hofer, Silver Republican and editor of the Capital Journal, spoke an hour and read the Bismarck letter in German, commenting thereon and giving a correct translation, showing that Bismarck "advises America to adopt independent bimetalism as the surest means of forcing Europe to remonetize silver."

This is coming nearer home for a correct translation of that famous letter than was taken by the goldbug press. Instead of getting a German scholar and conscientious, honorable, patriotic German-American citizen resident in New York, the New York World accepted the services of Judge(?) Julius Schutze of Texas, than whom a more unscrupulous, demagogic partizan and un-American German-American can not be found in this country.

However, the letter is printed in German in the various daily papers and Germans can read it for themselves; and while we have no disposition personally to ask the advice or opinion of any foreign authority as to what Americans should do in the management of this country's affairs, still American citizens of other tongues and native born should not be deceived and lied to about the contents of even a letter from Bismarck—nor from the Prince of Wales, nor Tom Ochiltree, nor ex-Queen Lil, nor Herr Most, nor Cecil Rhodes, nor C. P. Huntington, nor John P. Irish, nor Mark Hanna, nor Cetewayo, nor Li Hung Chang, nor the Devil, nor the Coast Mail for that matter.

Editors Herald: Why is it that the monopolists, trusts, moneyed aristocrats, etc., are opposed to the election of Hon. Wm. J. Bryan to the presidency of the U.S.? It is being unjust privileges, and they know these privileges will be greatly curtailed—if not entirely repudiated—in case W. J. Bryan is elected, for they very well know the platform on which he so firmly stands is solidly anchored on the impregnable rock of true and tried old-fashioned Democratic principles, and that he will firmly adhere to these principles, though all the combined forces of Hanna's McKinley and goldbugism array themselves against him.

They very well know that Mr. Bryan is in sympathy with the laboring classes—the bone and sinew of our country—and that he will never stand idly by and see the hand of monopoly press the "crown of thorns" on the brow of labor, nor see the laboring classes nailed to the monopolistic "cross of gold."

Bryan and Prosperity.

MARSHFIELD, Oct. 9, 1896. EDITOR HERALD: The arguments of the gold standard advocates are driving the farmers as well as all intelligent laborers into the Bryan ranks, hence Hanna sees defeat awaiting him, and McKinley realizes that he never can get out of the hole. What more does a farmer want to turn him to Bryan than for both free silver men and gold standard men to contend that free coinage of both gold and silver will double the price of the farm and its products, while they are now forced to sell their products at a loss? The New York Sun, a leading gold standard paper, recently said: "Should the corruption fund being raised in the east fail to turn enough of the doubtful states to McKinley to elect him and we should have free coinage of silver property would double in value, a farm or a house and lot that is worth ten thousand dollars would be worth twenty thousand, a bushel of wheat now worth fifty cents would be worth a dollar," and so on. The laborer must also realize that men will not start factories and manufacture goods while the prices are falling, knowing it would be a losing business, while on the other hand were prices rising it would guarantee a profit.

APPEAL TO THE CATHOLICS.

The McKinley and Hobart League Appeals to the Clergy for Aid.

New York, Sept. 30.—The following letter addressed to the Catholic clergy of the United States by it is said, the McKinley and Hobart Business Men's National Campaign Committee, was given out today:

Tenth street, above Chestnut, Philadelphia, September 19.—Reverend and Dear Sir: We are well aware that the dignity of your sacred office forbids the exercise of your influence in any matter involving mere questions of executive or legislative policy.

Nevertheless, we are fully persuaded that the questions before the country in the present presidential campaign are of an especially serious character because they involve fundamental moral issues. A decision in the selection of a president that will commit the executive to a policy that in its application will forcibly compromise private financial obligations, will repudiate a portion of the national debt and will be a violation of the basic principle that demands honesty between man and man.

Three Men Killed and Four Injured Near Roseburg.

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 6.—Two light locomotives ran into each other on the S. P. track about 7 o'clock this a. m. half a mile south of Green's station. As a result of the collision three men are dead and four injured. The list of the dead is as follows: John McGonigle, of Portland, a fireman on the south-bound engine, instantly killed.

A. N. Toy, of Salem, brakeman on the same engine, instantly killed. George Happersett, fireman on the north-bound engine, both legs broken and feet crushed, making it necessary to amputate one leg below the knee, and the foot of the other leg. Happersett died at 8:30 o'clock this evening. He left a widow and two children.

The injured are: Ben Lohr, head and face cut. Fred Wall, conductor of Porter's engine, bruised and cut about the face and head.

Engineer McCalley, bruised and hurt internally. James Porter, engineer on the north-bound engine, badly bruised and one ankle broken.

The coroner empaneled a jury and examined Conductor Wall, Engineer McCalley and Fireman Lohr. The accident must have occurred at 6:35 a. m., as McGonigle's watch stopped at that time. The remains of J. McGonigle and A. N. Toy were taken to their respective homes, Portland and Salem, tonight.

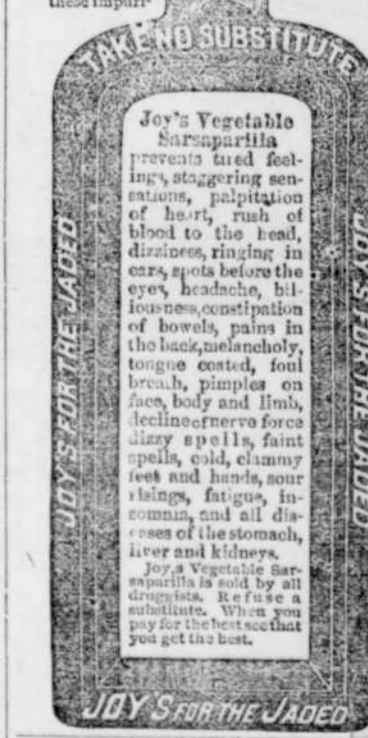
